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HIGHER EDUCATION ADMINISTRATION TRACK

The program prepares graduates for management positions in a variety of fields, including admissions, academic advising, residence life, student activities, financial aid, career services, and offices designed to support and retain historically underserved student populations. Many of our students gain experience in these areas through graduate assistant positions. Students within the program will jump into leadership positions on campus as graduate assistants in various departments within the Division of Student Affairs. PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE

Students must complete one-to-two guided internships as part of the Higher Education Leadership degree. An internship typically lasts one semester or the equivalent of 150 hours of work on a supervised project.
