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Anna Dunson's Field Report on Her Information Literacy Fellowship

With a fairly impromptu move to Kansas City encroaching last July to join my fella at his new but temporary duty station of Fort Leavenworth, the pressure to acquire employment in the area was mounting with a quickness, and my entire family was on the case. It was my father who first emailed me the announcement for an Information Literacy Fellowship with Miller Nichols Library at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. However, it was the language and the energy it expressed that won my attention. The typical drab duty description was instead a personality-centric call for those game for fast-paced but supported learning as members of an innovative and hyper-collaborative instructional team. After making it through to the interview, I was able to marry the collective voice of the job posting to its owners,

Videoconferencing with this creative pair only further endeared me to the prospect of having found not only an ideal work environment but also my much longed for peer group, which had previously alluded me as the youngest as well as newest employee at my prior job.

Spoiler alert! I was hired on, and my time here has far exceeded even the loftiest of my expectations! From our first day as Fellows, for which a department-wide lunch was held as welcome, I felt immersed as a true faculty/staff member. The summer weeks that followed only solidified this as we were thoughtfully introduced to all faces of the library via in-depth orientations with department heads and beyond as well as invited to attend and encouraged to lend our voices to forthcoming administrative meetings. Not even in my employment with six-

person libraries have I been made to feel as intimately familiar with the working

parts of an organization; and, as an academic library newbie, this has been invaluable to my learning experience.

Now, as for my involvement as a team member of the information literacy instructional program, Research Essentials, what isn't there to say? I in no way exaggerate when I say that in my decade of professional employment this has been the most worthwhile by far. Even in its challenges, the Fellowship has never failed to be broadening, empowering, and all-round inspiring (again, to the credit of its creators). The setup of Research Essentials is a bit unique, so I will defer to its program description at<u>www.library.umkc.edu/reachessentials</u> for the extended explanation. But, in short, Research Essentials is a library-led information literacy program that is integrated into the UMKC General Education program via Discourse (writing and speaking courses). Research Essentials provides optional, scaffolded weeklong instruction via a flipped classroom model, covering such topics as identifying source types; evaluating information needs; and finding, using, and integrating sources.

Since my start in July 2016, I have taught 44 classes in addition to maintaining reference duties, which include reference desk hours, chat references hours, and individual research coaching appoint-

ments. While my first semester of teaching was guite nerve-wracking, it was not from lack of training, observation, or confidence building provided beforehand by the team. And, after getting just one semester under my belt, I can honestly say that I joyfully anticipate face-to-face instruction sessions, finding them exhilarating and validating of the program's mission. Even as I reflect, I am misty-eved over my impending departure, as this program not only succeeds in winning the buy-in of its participants but the utmost loyalty of those who have had the privilege of implementing it. So, I now find myself with the bittersweet task of recruiting my replacement, passing along the opportunity that has been so formative in revitalizing my identity as an up-and-coming librarian. Yet, I revel in the notion that my loss is your prospective gain!
