Acquaints students with health and safety issues in technical occupations. Emphasis will be on safety regulations, agencies, codes, health issues, environmental concerns in industry, and ergonomic environmental factors in the workplace.

COURSE ACTIVITIES/ASSIGNMENTS/REQUIREMENTS

Hazard Map

Once you know the basic kinds of hazards, you can begin to identify them in the workplace. This activity will help you identify hazards that you may have been overlooking for years.

OSHA Quizzes

After reviewing OSHA PowerPoints and notes, students will complete quizzes inside Blazeview.

Participation

Grade will be given on class and course participation. This course is built around the idea that everyone will engage in the learning process and classroom activities.

Create a Safety Booklet

This activity will allow you to create a comprehensive training document that can be used in your classrooms or workplace. Its purpose is to assist you in teaching others about safe workplace behaviors. Field Study

You will evaluate topics on safety and health in the workplace and report your findings.

Final Exam (Mock Training Assignment)

You will select one preapproved topic and to create a safety training program. While information that is more detailed will be handed out in class, you should know that you will be allowed to use some outside help to complete this assignment (students, children, friends, co-workers). They can be used as actors, directors, video editors, technology gurus. However, they cannot be associated in any way with the writers.
