COURSE DESCRIPTION

Development and defense of the dissertation proposal and the dissertation. Must be taken each fall and spring semester until the dissertation is completed. Number of hours taken per term must be approved by the dissertation chair. A minimum of 9 hours must be completed.

CO1. Develop, implement and defend a doctoral dissertation research study to the satisfaction of the dissertation committee

COURSE ACTIVITIES / ASSIGNMENTS / REQUIREMENTS & EVALUATION

Dissertation hours are taken, generally in the final semesters before completion of the degree, while the student develops, researches, and defends the dissertation. Progress toward completion is evaluated by the dissertation director. As long as the progress toward completion is deemed adequate by the director, the student is given an In Process (IP) grade. May be repeated for credit, and the number of hours taken per semester is approved by the director. Upon completion of the dissertation and the approval of the dissertation committee, a grade of Satisfactory (S) will be reported.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

The course is an independent study type course in which there are no formal class meetings scheduled.

POLICY STATEMENT ON PLAGIARISM AND CHEATING
