# I. Text

**II.** Course description: Prerequisite: FREN 2002 or consent of instructor. An advanced study of grammar, syntax, and vocabulary, with refinement of writing skills through composition.

## II. Course goal:

Refine, deepen, and perfect the students' knowledge of grammatical forms acquired earlier and introduce new grammatical structures. Practice the use of the grammatical forms under study in appropriate contexts starting with the workbook accompanying the text and ending with essays and translations.

## **III. Expected Student Learning Outcomes:**

As a result of this course, students will be able to:

- Express themselves in French at the advanced low level according to the ACTFL scale.

- Write substantial essays on a variety of topics.

- Translate literary and journalistic texts from French into English and from English into French.

## **IV. Course Objectives**

At the end of instruction in FREN 4110 the learner is able to:

1. Use advanced grammatical forms in an appropriate way taking into account the spirit of the target language.

2. Write a 3-4-page essay on a relatively abstract topic.

3. Translate literary and journalistic texts from French into English and from English into French.

4. Discuss rules of composition, analyze mistakes, and correct other students' composition errors.

5. Demonstrate knowledge of sociolinguistic differences between the native and target languages.
