Course Description:

A study of legal research methods utilizing state and federal sources. Students will develop professional skills as they read and analyze appellate court opinions, legislation and pleadings.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. To prepare students to conduct legal research and apply it in a form and manner that will enable them to support the legal system.
 - a. Analysis of problems and recognition of legal issues.
 - b. Use of encyclopedias, treatises, restatements, statutes, regulations, digests, indexes, West's key number system, and computer assisted research methods.
 - c. Use of Cite check and/or Shepard's to update case law using both traditional and computer assisted methods).
 - d. Preparation of clear, concise, and well-organized legal memoranda and reports.
- 2. To comprehend and make informed decisions regarding the ethical dilemmas of their profession, in order to understand the cultural values they must serve in the performance of their responsibilities.
- **3.** To understand the American legal system in the manner necessary to enable them to function within the system and support its mission of service to society.

Class Preparation:

In order to achieve the learning objectives for this course, students should understand and comprehend the assigned readings, PowerPoint slides provided as a study aid, participation in class discussions and other preparatory assignments. In order to get the most out of class time, students are expected to have read the assigned material and to complete any specific assignments for the assigned week.

Student Protocol:

Students are expected to conduct themselves in a professional and appropriate manner while in this course. Disparaging and/or discriminatory and/or harassing/threatening comments will not be tolerated in the discussion board postings or any communications with fellow students or the instructor. Instructions on how to submit using this tool for any written assignments will be given on GeorgiaVIEW with the appropriate assignments. The instructor reserves the right to use SafeAssign on discussion board postings if determined the work is not the student's own.

Discussion Board Postings:

This is an online course, however, an educational program centered on classroom instruction is predicated on the concept of class attendance at scheduled class sessions. Faculty is required to keep attendance records for compliance with various federal regulations. Student absences can have a deleterious effect on the student's grades or the continuing eligibility for financial assistance.

In order to track attendance there will be weekly discussion board postings. Each week students will have instructions on the postings for the course in our class discussion board. The instructions may include a minimum number of postings expected for the week. Students are required to read all of the other student's postings as well. The postings will count for 100 points.

For the discussion board postings, each week's postings will be assessed on a four-point scale:

4 points: The posting(s) integrate multiple viewpoints and weaves both class readings and other participant's postings into their discussion of the subject.

3 points: The posting(s) builds upon the ideas of another participant or two, and digs deeper into the question(s) posed by the instructor.

2 points: A single posting that does not interact with or incorporate the ideas of other participants' comments OR posting(s) that do not elicit further discussion.

1 point: A simple "me too" comment that neither expands the conversation nor demonstrates any degree of reflection by the student.

0 points: No comment or completely inappropriate posting (in other words has nothing to do with the question asked).

Weekly Quizzes (See Course Assignments for due dates)

Each week a 25 point quiz will be administered for a total of 200 points throughout the semester. It is to be reflection of your own effort and is to be completed by the due date. Quizzes will be short answer type questions designed to allow students to show mastery of the week's materials. Proper citations are to be used in all quizzes.

Weekly Assignments (See Course Assignments for due dates)

Weeks 1-7 students will be required to complete two assignments based upon the assigned reading materials. Assignments are designed to be a real world application of the course materials. Each assignment will be worth a maximum of 30 points (so 60 points each week for a total of 420 points). These assignments are to be the students own effort and NOT a group type project. These assignments may be used to base the topic of the final legal memorandum.

Final legal memorandum (See Course Assignments for due dates)

A final legal memorandum is to be completed by each student. This is to be an individual assignment designed by each student and the instructor. It is designed to be a

cumulative illustration of everything the student has learned throughout the semester. It is worth 100 points with more information to follow.

Presentation of legal memorandum (See Course Assignments for due dates)

A presentation of the student's legal memorandum is required. The presentation must be in a Power Point and it is worth 30 points. The presentation should include materials about the different legal resources used in the completion of the memorandum. The instructor will open the presentation discussions during week 7. Students will post their presentation on the discussion board and will be the leader of the discussion. Fellow classmates are directed to submit any questions via the discussion board for the student to answer during your presentation week.

Communications and Grading

Students can expect the instructor to respond to emails/postings/messages within 24 hours of receipt Monday through Friday. On the weekends, Saturday through Sunday, responses within 48 hours of receipt. The instructor will post announcements regarding unavailability when away at conferences and will respond within 48 hours.

Grades will be posted within 72 hours of the due date. If there is a delay in grading an announcement will be posted.

Late Work

Working in the legal field involves meeting and abiding by deadlines. Therefore, all materials are due as stated on the Course Assignments by Mondays at 5:00pm EST, the GeorgiaVIEW server controls. Late work will not be accepted after the deadline. If students are having technical difficulties, visit <u>http://help8.view.usg.edu/ics/support/default.asp?deptID=8075</u>. Students should plan ahead and submit assignments or take exams early to avoid technical issues at the last minute. If students continue experiencing difficulties submitting work via GeorgiaVIEW, contact the professor prior to the assignment due date and time.

Academic Honor Code:
