REQUIRED TEXTBOOKS: *The Technique of Orchestration*, sixth edition by Kent Kennan and Donald Grantham – students will be tested from this text.

CATALOGUE DESCRIPTION: Prerequisites: MUSC 2012 and MUSC 2052; and, for music education majors only, a grade of "S" in MUE 2999. Basic techniques of scoring for school choral and instrumental groups.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: This course will enable the student to:

- 1. Know instrument and voice capabilities, ranges, transpositions and idiom.
- 2. Be able to write for small instrumental and vocal choirs.
- 3. Be able to write for a mixed instrumental ensemble of wind, strings and percussion.
- 4. Be able to write for the marching band.
- 5. Be able to write for adult choral ensembles.
- 6. Be able to write for elementary vocal ensemble.
- 7. Be able to write for a standard rhythm section (piano bass, and drums).
- 8. Improve on notational practices using both written and computer notation tools.
- 9. Become familiar with a standard orchestration text that can be used for reference for future arrangement projects.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Complete all reading assignments for the class that the assignment is made.
- 2. Take careful notes on class lecture materials. Class lectures will be used to supplement and clarify the text readings. This will be tested on the final examination.
- 3. Become familiar with Finale computer notation program. It is the student's responsibility to learn the program outside of class by the third class period. The CAMIL Lab has Finale, which comes with several very fine tutorials.
- 4. Students must have arrangements completed by the class period that they are due for in-class critiques. All arrangement assignments are required to be completed in Finale computer notation format, in proper score layout, with all the correct transpositions. To get full credit on arrangement assignments students must complete a full score (no parts) and:
 - 1) have the completed arrangement ready to play for the critique session that the arrangement is due, and play back the arrangement through the computer system for the class and instructor to hear
 - 2) following playback, make all changes to the assignment that the instructor recommends, and,
 - 3) submit the final copy electronically to the instructor at dmorris.edu by e-mail attachment within the specified time period for that assignment.

Important

Students must become aware of computer lab hours of operation, protect their work electronically, and learn to avoid the common pitfalls of electronic storage.

EVALUATION: Evaluation will be based on (100 Point Total). Completion of all assignments and tests is required. Students not completing ALL assignments including the 9 arrangements, the transposition quiz, and the final comprehensive exam will have their grade lowered no matter what the numerical average in the class.

Attendance/Class Participation: Students missing 20% of classes for whatever reason are subject to receiving an F, no matter what the evaluation tally. Also, no matter what the final numerical average, the instructor reserves the discretionary right to lower any student's grade due to poor class participation, attendance, excessive tardiness, or disruptive behavior.

Transposition quiz: 20 points – 10 examples 2 points each.

Final comprehensive test over the Kennan text and lecture material: 20Points (20 multi-choice statements)
