COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Study of pronunciation and phonetics of Latin, Italian, Spanish, French, English, and German as applied to solo and ensemble singing. Two class periods per week.

REQUIRED TEXTS, RESOURCES, & MATERIALS:

Handout material; musical scores in Italian, German, & French; dictionaries, hard copy and on-line

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Students are expected to:

- demonstrate the ability to indicate in writing, using the International Phonetic Alphabet, the pronunciation of all the languages studied. (DOM Outcomes: #2; NASM Standards: VIII.A., #6., b.2.);
- 2. demonstrate the ability to verbalize the correct pronunciation of all the languages. (DOM Outcomes: #2; NASM Standards: VIII.A.,#6.,2.);
- 3. to perform musical compositions in all the languages being studied. (DOM Outcomes: #2; NASM Standards: VIII.A.,#6.,

EDUCATIONAL OUTCOMES: Upon successful completion of this course, students will demonstrate through performance:

- 1. the ability to use the International Phonetic Alphabet in preparation for pronunciation;
- 2. the ability to correctly verbalize from the written IPA symbols correct pronunciation;

3. the ability to sing vocal literature in all the languages studied.

ASSIGNMENTS/COURSE COMPONENTS: Students will attend and make preparation for:

1. twice weekly classes in which there is both written and aural work. A homework assignment is given as preparation for each class.

ASSESSMENT:

Students will be assigned grades equally weighed on; class attendance, class participation, completion of homework assignments, and singing examinations.

ATTENDANCE & TARDINESS POLICIES:

It is the expectation that students attend all classes except for those excused in advance due to illness or personal/family emergencies. It is the expectation that students will be punctual. This course conforms to the official VSU policy as stated in the VSU Catalogue:
