Phillips, Kenneth H. *Basic Techniques of Conducting*. New York: Oxford University Press, 1997.

Course objectives:

1) Learn the fundamental skills necessary to become an effective conductor.

2) Practice these skills in front of an ensemble.

3) Benefit from critiques from instructor and fellow students.

4) Provide constructive critiques for fellow students.

5) Gain an appreciation for the art of conducting and use these skills to become more complete musicians.

Educational outcomes (DOM Outcomes 3,4; VSU GE Outcome 7):

1) Student will learn how to prepare to rehearse and conduct a variety of ensembles.

2) Student will have learned how to communicate musically through a clear technique.

3) Student will have gained an understanding and appreciation for this discipline.

4) Student will learn how to read and analyze a musical score, as well as apply the appropriate conducting techniques based on the score.

Assignments:

Students are expected to prepare the assigned chapter(s) ahead of time. Each student will have the opportunity to conduct the "ensemble," which will consist of the class, in both instrumental and vocal excerpts. Each student is expected to bring their primary instrument to class to perform in the ensemble. The video assignments require preparation before the class session, and will also serve as an additional instructional tool. Each student will need a smartphone to record the video assignments or a USB flash

drive to copy the video for further study, and will need to purchase a baton (available from the Kilgard's).

Assessment:

Students will be assessed based on attendance (1/4th of final grade), video evaluation homework assignments (1/4th of final grade), and midterm conducting exam (1/4th of final grade). A final podium session will serve as the final exam, counting for 1/4th of the final grade.

<u>Attendance</u>: 10 points for each class attended. Any unexcused absence will result in a 0 for that day's class, and each unexcused late arrival (arrival after attendance is taken) to class subtracts 5 points for that day's attendance grade. The instructor will determine what constitutes an excused absence or late arrival (such as illness with a Doctor's note or personal/family emergencies).

<u>Homework/video evaluation</u>: Up to 10 points for each assignment, graded on attention to detail and thoroughness of self-critique. Homework assignments are due the class following the return of your flash drive. Late assignments will be dropped a letter grade each week it is late.

<u>Midterm conducting exam/Final exam</u>: Graded on implementation of techniques discussed in the text and class for each work performed.
