CATALOG DESCRIPTION

A seminar to facilitate and structure students' transition from graduate school to postgraduation social work practice.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course draws on topic areas that are relevant to beginning practice including the transition from graduate school, job marketability, job searches, assumption of a professional practice role, ethical social work practice, preparation for professional examinations, professional test-taking, and developing the attitude of a long-term learner. Speakers from the regional social work community will be asked to provide guest lectures to students. Students will work independently out of class to prepare for the licensure examination including taking practice examination in preparation for the actual examination. The class is designed to provide closure on graduate school and ensure their readiness for job searches and professional practice.

I reserve the right to alter the course content, including readings or elements of assignments, at any time. However, assignment due dates and grading standards will not be changed.

PREREQUISITES

Admission to the program.

RELATION TO OTHER COURSES

Built on the content of all other courses in the social work curriculum, SOWK 7630 is designed as a bridge to professional post-graduate social work practice. Course content helps students to transition into professional practice through preparing and completing the professional licensing exam. Additionally, the course provides content on salient aspects of professional social work practice. Finally, students are given skills to enable them to prepare a professional resume and t interview for professional positions.

- 1. Demonstrate understanding of social work professionalism as defined by the advanced generalist perspective.
- 2. Articulate the importance of professional standards and licensure and for professional development.
- 3. Demonstrate an understanding of licensure requirements, processes, and preparation for the licensing examination.
- 4. Articulate an understanding of current social/cultural issues relevant to social work that present obstacles to services and/or ethical dilemmas.

Written Work & Submission of Assignments

- Your written work should show thoroughness, accuracy and professionalism. All work should be carefully proofread and corrected. Unless otherwise instructed, all assignments must be word processed, double spaced with numbered pages. Papers should use standard margins (one inch from the top, bottom, and sides).
- Late papers will lose one full letter grade (10%) for every 24-hour period they are late (including weekends).
- Written work will be carefully evaluated for grammatical errors, spelling, and concise and appropriate expression of concepts and ideas because this is one of the last courses that you will complete before presenting yourself to the community at large as a professional social worker. Social workers, in all career capacities, are expected to communicate as a professional, whether the written or spoken word.

ASSIGNMENTS

You will demonstrate your achievement of course outcomes through your submitted projects and assignments:

1. Critical analysis of three professional websites

You are to visit the following three websites:

National Association of Social Workers GA (<u>http://www.naswga.org/</u>); National Association of Black Social Workers (http://www.nabsw.org/); National Association of Social Workers (<u>http://www.naswdc.org/</u>). Spend time looking at the websites. Then do the following. 1. Aside from the obvious (race, geographical area etc), identify one substantive difference in each webpage, a theme focus or purpose that is unique and particular to each to each organization and describe that difference.

2. Identify a particular aspect of each organization's webpage that you might find useful in the near and distant future.

3. Identify how joining any particular national organization will help you meet your professional goal(s).

2. LMSW Licensure Practice Exams 1, 3 & 4

Submit, in class, your answers for the practice exams 1 & 4 (don't destroy your textbook—make a photocopy). the idea is to do this at home, then bring a copy to class, which you will hand in, along with a 1 to 2 page critique of your test. Here is the protocol.

- 1. take test at home.
- 2. score it on honestly.
- 3. review your wrong answers and right answers.
- 4. notice any patterns in your wrong answers
- 5. write a critique of your testing. include the following:
 - a. your overall score
 - b. comment on the things you seemed to know well.
 - c. identify and comment on the things you did not do well on.

d. observe and comment on any patterns you notice in your right/wrong answers.

e. comment on any self-observations you made during the exam that could be liabilities during the test-taking.

This assignment will be graded according to the timely completion and submission of the exam responses. This assignment carries 20 points for each submission

2. Writing Assignment: "Changes"

Write a 3-5 page self-reflection paper on how you have modified or perhaps even changed some of your values, attitudes, and assumptions over the course of this MSW program. This could involve values, attitudes, and assumptions with regard to yourself and your own professional boundaries, behaviors, "use of self," etc., or toward your clients, or toward the social work macro world (i.e., supervisors, agencies, etc.). In addition, and in light of the first part of the assignment, write about how you view yourself as a budding professional. Do you like what you see? Remember that your perceptions of yourself may not be consistent with what you project to others!

4. Professional development plan

A major part of professionalization is the pursuit of specific areas of expertise. Each of you, in the first few years after graduation, will want to continue your life long learning process, by a. focusing on specific areas of growth/expertise and b. planning some structured learning activities that aid you in those specific areas. These areas can be learning more on a particular subject (for example, personality disorders) or learning more about specific treatment methods (EMDR for example). The structured activities could be any number of things including joining a book club, reading a specific book, creating a reading list, joining a supervision group, attending workshops or training, getting online certification in an area or enrolling in an ongoing training program (For example, reading a book on personality disorders or attending a week long training on EMDR).

Your task in this assignment is to list three growth areas of interest and briefly comment -no more than 2 sentences per each area, why it is an interest.

Then, for each of those three interests, identify two specific structured learning activities that you will honestly look for during the first two years after graduation

DIVISION OF SOCIAL WORK and UNIVERSITY POLICIES

The goal of the Division of Social Work is to prepare students for the professional practice of social work. The Division requires students to adhere to professional practices and standards in all classes and practicum. These practices and standards are outlined in the MSW Student Code of Conduct which can be found on pages 23-27 of the current *MSW Student Handbook.* The Code of Conduct must be signed by all students beginning MSW students.

The following standards are not negotiable: Students may depend on well-planned classes and knowledgeable instructors. Professors are committed to the facilitation of student success. Learning is a complex phenomenon for which BOTH instructors and students are responsible. Evaluation criteria are stated clearly in the syllabus. However, if students have questions about grading, it is the students' responsibility to discuss these matters with their instructors. The course syllabus represents a contract between students and the instructor. Professors reserve the right to modify syllabi, and students will be notified in writing when such changes are made. Likewise, students are responsible for reading and following instructions on the syllabi.

Class Attendance. Because the MSW Program is a professional program, class attendance is **MANDATORY**. The Attendance Policy is extremely important and can be found in the current *MSW Student Handbook* on page 19. Students are expected to be on time for class and to return from breaks in a timely manner. Likewise, students are expected to participate in class discussions and activities.

Submission of Assignments. All assignments must be submitted ON TIME and IN THE MANNER directed by the faculty (e.g., brought to class, sent to an assignment drop box, etc). Deadlines are extremely important for professional social workers. Additional information about assignment submission is found in the Attendance Policy.

Academic Honesty. Plagiarism and other forms of academic dishonesty are not acceptable in a professional social work program. Students who engage in this type behavior risk failure on specific assignments, in the course, and possible dismissal from the MSW Program. Academic dishonesty is prohibited by the university as well as the Division of Social Work. The following link outlines <u>VSU's Academic Honesty Policies</u>. Incompletes: Incomplete grades are given only in cases of extreme emergency with proper documentation, and are granted only with the prior approval of the instructor. Policies governing Incompletes are found in the *MSW Student Handbook*.

Academic Performance: Students are expected to maintain a 3.00 grade point average in the MSW Program. A discussion of all academic expectations and grading can be found in the *MSW Student Handbook,* including the Division's policy of Academic Deficiency Points given for grades lower than C.
