ART 3051 PRINTMAKING I

Credit load: 0-6-3

CATALOGUE DESCRIPTION: Prerequisite: ART 1010 and ART 1020. An introduction to basic printmaking processes and techniques including historical background and significance.

TEXT: Assigned readings by Instructor

SELECTED ASSESSMENTS and/or EVALUATIONS: Methods of evaluation may include:

- 1. Attendance and adherence to studio policies and studio practices.
- 2. Demonstration of key concepts and components of printmaking through the execution and completion of all studio assignments in selected print media;
- 3. Demonstration of key concepts and components of printmaking through self assessment, written assignments, oral presentations, and formal critiques.

CLASSROOM POLICIES:

Attendance:

The University expects that all students shall regularly attend all scheduled class meetings held for instruction or examination. Credit:

Credit is defined as a basic unit of work, as it relates to hours of faculty in-class instruction and hours of out-of-class student work. The definition and expectation will differ in laboratory, lecture, and directed or independent study classes. An hour of instruction is the equivalent to 50 minutes of class time (often called a contact hour). Contact hours and student outside academic activity hours required for specific types of courses are as follows:

Laboratory / Studio Classes:

For each two hours of laboratory or studio classroom instruction, students are expected to work a minimum of one hour outside normal class time completing assignments. A three credit hour laboratory course will require a minimum average of three hours per week of student outside academic activity.

(These are minimum or average expectation for student academic activity as it relates to college credit. To earn a desired grade may require more than just the average investment of expected student academic activity.)

Course Format: A three credit hour course that meets for three periods per day, two days per week for the semester. The students will be required to work on individual projects that will be followed by class critiques. In addition, the students will be required to submit a presentation portfolio, research assignment, and submit a final print portfolio.

Method of Instruction: This class is taught through a laboratory situation. Each new method of printmaking is introduced through lecture and demonstrations. An instructional handout or lecture notes are presented at the beginning of each new problem and a critique held at the end of an allotted time with student work properly presented. Students are helped individually as work progresses.

It is imperative that you <u>take notes</u> and use the provided outline for your notes during demonstrations and lectures.

TEXT: None assigned for this course. Outside reading assignments will be required during the semester.

ASSIGNMENTS: All assignments must be submitted on appointed due dates or the work will be penalized one letter grade for each class the work is late. For print assignments students will receive self

evaluation forms with questions related to the assigned medium, image development, and studio performance. Students will complete the self-assessment and turn it in with completed prints. The instructor will conduct a group critique and individual critiques with students and will assign a grade for each project. Written and oral research assignments will be presented with instructions and grading criteria. Materials lists, course schedule, concept portfolio information, and other items will be given to students as part of the course introduction. Make sure that all of these materials are read and understood. Assignment and schedule information is subject to change. *It is imperative that you regularly check e-mail messages for any changes that may be made.*

GRADING STANDARDS: GRADING STANDARDS FOR STUDIO ASSIGNMENTS

A 100%-90% Excellent work that exceeds all major criteria for the assignment.

- Creative approach to medium to produce a visual statement as defined in research presentation. Work clearly communicates strong conceptual and/or expressive idea(s).
- Skillful control of printmaking medium and technical process.
- High quality edition printing with little to no inconsistency and excellent craftsmanship
- Demonstrated additional effort through experimentation and image development.
- Good adherence to all studio practices (including attendance) and course policies and productive use of studio time.

B 89%-80% Above average work that meets all major criteria for the assignment.

- Creative approach to medium to produce a visual statement as defined in research presentation. Work communicates good conceptual and/or expressive idea(s).
- Skillful control of printmaking medium and technical process. Minimal flaws in execution.
- Quality edition printing with minor inconsistency and above average craftsmanship
- Demonstrated fair effort through experimentation and image development.
- Good adherence to most studio practices (including attendance) and course policies and productive use of studio time.

C 79%-70% Average work that meets most major criteria for the assignment.

- Approach to medium reflects a visual statement that is not clearly defined in research presentation. Work communicates fair conceptual and/or expressive idea(s).
- Adequate control of printmaking medium and technical process; distinct problems in execution.
- Fair edition printing with evidence of inconsistency and average craftsmanship
- Demonstrated minimum effort through experimentation and design development.
- Inconsistent adherence to most studio practices (including attendance) and course policies and less effective use of studio time.

D 69%-60% **Below** average work that fails to meet most major criteria for the assignment.

- Approach to medium reflects a visual statement that is not clearly defined in research presentation. Work communicates mediocre / contrived conceptual and/or expressive idea(s).
- Minimum control of printmaking medium and technical process. Poor execution.
- Below average edition printing with evidence of inconsistency and below average craftsmanship
- Lacks involvement with experimentation and design development.
- Poor observance of studio practices (including attendance) and course policies

F 59%-0% Unacceptable work that is incomplete or fails to meet all major criteria of assignment.

- Approach to medium reflects a visual statement that is not clearly defined in research presentation Work fails to communicate strong conceptual and/or expressive idea(s).
- Failure to demonstrate adequate control of printmaking medium and technical process.
- Poor edition printing with inconsistency and poor craftsmanship
- Little to no effort through experimentation and design development.
- Poor adherence to most studio practices (including attendance) and course policies and poor use of studio time.

Students will also receive evaluations for research assignment. Specific criteria for the assignment will be included with the course handouts. Sign-up sheets for research artists will be posted in the studio.
