CATALOG DESCRIPTION: Principal ensemble for wind and percussion principals and other principals according to assignment by the Head of the Department of Music. Open to any VSU student by permission of the instructor.

RATIONALE: Concert Band will provide students with large ensemble performance and increase familiarity with literature for symphonic band, wind ensemble and large chamber ensemble.

TEXT: Musical arrangements selected by the band director will be provided.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Upon successful completion of this course, students will
1. Demonstrate general musical and technical development as well as increased awareness of musical structure, style, and performance practice. (Dept. of Music – Acquire the ability to teach music at various levels to different age groups and in a variety of classroom and ensemble settings; VSU - #6)
2. Develop an awareness of the rehearsal process and their responsibilities within that process. (Dept. of Music – Acquire the ability to teach music at various levels to different age groups and in a groups and in a variety of Classroom and ensemble settings; VSU - #6)

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ASSIGNMENTS:

Attend all regularly scheduled rehearsals Perform on two concerts during the Spring semester Learn music according to the schedule provided Bring all materials to class (instrument, music, and pencil) *Assignments are constructed to provide the structure needed to meet the course objective(s).

ASSESSMENT:

You will receive a letter grade and one semester-hour credit for MUSC 3850.

Grading Criteria:

1. Positive Learning Environment (20%)

Having all materials (instrument, music, and pencil) with you each day and contributing in a positive manner.

2. Music Preparation (30%)

Each student will be responsible for preparing music as outlined on the calendar (distributed by the director). It is the responsibility of the student to learn his/her music to allow the rehearsal time to be used for rehearsing and putting together of individual parts. Some

music will require practice outside of class time in order to reach a high standard of performance.

3. Attendance (50%)

Each absence drops your attendance grade by 8 points. Six or more absences results in an automatic F for the course. Please refer to the Undergraduate Catalog regarding the attendance policy. A missed performance requires advanced notice to the Director. A missed performance due to illness requires verification from a physician. An unexcused missed performance drops your attendance grade by 25 points. Roll will be taken at the beginning of each class session. Students who are less than 15 minutes late will be counted tardy (three tardies counts as an absence). Students that are more than 15 minutes late will be counted absent.
