

## Handout for History Majors who may become Teachers

### UPPER-LEVEL HISTORY COURSES 30 HOURS

The following are STRONGLY RECOMMENDED as PART of the EIGHT Upper-level History Content Courses:

HIST 4211 or 4212 = Georgia History

HIST 4204, 4205 or 4206 = Modern U.S. History

HIST 4100, 4231, 4261, or 4241

### MINOR AND/OR ELECTIVES 27-30 HOURS

For a Teaching career, it is STRONGLY RECOMMENDED that Majors take courses in Economics, Geography, Political Science, Anthropology, or Sociology; also consider either EDUC 2110, 2120, or 2130 for the field experience (see below).

### INFORMATION REGARDING EDUCATIONAL CERTIFICATION

#### **Graduate w/ GPA of 2.5**

Pass **GACE I Basic Skills** exam, or exempt w/ 1000 on SAT (no minimum on Verbal or Math) or combined score of 43 on ACT. If you need to take the GACE I, consider, taking exam in your Freshman Year since it has math. **Note:** a 1030 total for the verbal & quantitative sections of the GRE (Graduate Record Exam) will also exempt the GACE I.

Pass **GACE II** exams in Content Areas (US History and World History) during Senior Year (see below).

Might take **SPEC 3000** as an undergraduate b/c this course is required for eventual certification in GA, but **SPEC 3000** requires MGED 2999 as a pre-requisite.

See VSU's Career Center in Powell Hall for Education Career Day.

During senior year, apply for teaching jobs (<http://www.teachgeorgia.org/>) and if successful, work w/ your principal on the best path to attain certification. For example, one option is the ACT program offered by VSU's College of Education (see below).

If you do not get a teaching job, consider VSU's College of Education's program whereby a fulltime student can earn certification & a master's degree in Education (see below).

Note: the GPS's in US History & World History can also be used as study guides for the GACE II tests in US History & World History b/c the GACE II tests are supposed to be aligned to the new curriculum.

## How You Can Prepare to Enter Valdosta State's ACT (Alternative Certification for Teaching) Program

1. Observe public school classrooms while you are an undergraduate by working as a substitute teacher or serving as a volunteer.
2. EDUC 2110, EDUC 2120, & EDUC 2130 require field experience. These courses are not required for entering the ACT program, but enrolling might help you make your career decision.

What you need to get started:

- A Bachelor's Degree in History
- 2.5 GPA
- Pass GACE I (or exempt w/ 1000+ on SAT or 43+ on ACT) and GACE II in your teaching content area. <http://www.gace.nesinc.com/>
- Apply for a teaching job: [teachgeorgia.org](http://www.teachgeorgia.org/home.aspx) is the statewide application process <http://www.teachgeorgia.org/home.aspx>
- When you are hired, the school system will ask the Professional Standards Commission for a non-renewable certificate (NT-4) for you (good for 3-5 years).

To Change the NT-4 certificate to a Clear Renewable Certificate (T-4)

- Complete a transcript evaluation form and submit to the Director of Certification, Dewar College of Education, Dean's Office <http://www.valdosta.edu/coe/teached/index.shtml>
- Upon receiving the transcript evaluation, meet with an advisor in the College of Education to determine a timeline for entering the ACT program
- Apply to VSU's Graduate School (see <http://www.valdosta.edu/gradschool/> for on-line application) and take the GRE (Graduate Record Exam) or the MAT (Miller's Analogy Test). Application deadlines are on the web.
- Upon acceptance to graduate school, you will then attend a group interview and an on-site writing exercise as the final screening for acceptance to an ACT cohort.
- An ACT cohort begins either in June or January.
- There are TWO tracks leading to certification:

(1) For working teachers: ACT (18 hours over 3 semesters) for clear renewable T-4 certificate:

2 classes in summer term

2 classes in fall term (including first teaching internship)

2 classes in spring term (including second teaching internship)

An additional 18 hours will complete a master's degree in Education (M.Ed) & T-5 certification (a T-5 = certificate for teacher w/ a master's degree).

(2) For full time students: a 4-semester MAT degree & T-5 certificate.
