Honors Introduction to The Visual Arts (Core Area C)

Taught by Dr. Brad Finson 3 credit hours CRN22196
ART 1100, section A 3:30-4:45 TR UC 2004

An introductory survey of world art, at the Honors level, from prehistoric to the contemporary period, set in the context of historical, political, economic, and social events.

Honors Introduction to Anthropology

Taught by Dr. Matthew Richard 3 credit hours CRN 20764
ANTH 1102H, section A 11:00-12:15 TR UC 1156

Fundamentals of anthropology, with particular focus on such disciplinary subfields as physical anthropology, archaeology, and cultural anthropology. Emphasis is on the employment of the anthropological perspective and the application of anthropological concepts and models to contemporary issues and problems.

Honors English Composition II (Core Area A)

Taught by Marty Willams 3 credit hours CRN 20278
ENGL 1102H, section A 2:00-3:15 TR WH 262

Prerequisite: ENGL 1101 or 1101H. An honors-level composition course, focusing on writing skills beyond the levels of proficiency required by ENGL 1102, that emphasizes advanced rhetorical strategies and argument/persuasion. The course also stresses, via an array of theme-based studies, more varied forms of interpretation and evaluation and incorporates more advanced research skills than those taught in ENGL1102.

Honors English (Core Area C)

Taught by Maren Clegg-Hyer 3 credit hours CRN 20299
ENGL 2120H 1:00-1:50MWF WH 153

Prerequisite: ENGL 1102 or 1102H. An in-depth study of selected works of literature and their cultural backgrounds from the seventeenth century to the present. This course includes introductions to the major concepts and themes represented in trans-national and transgeneric literary texts from periods such as the Enlightenment, Romantic, Victorian, Modern, and Contemporary. Special

emphasis on multicultural and comparative aspects of the literature and on large, overarching themes and concepts.

Honors United State History Since 1865 (Core Area E)

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| Taught by Dr. Dixie Haggard | 3 credit hours | CRN 22018 |
| HIST 2112H, section A | 3:30-4:45 TR | WH 257 |

This course provides students with a general knowledge and understanding of U.S. history from the period of Reconstruction to the present. The course will be taught thematically and will cover the major political, economic, social, and cultural developments in the United States since 1865. This course will help students to analyze historical events and sources of historical information so that they may come to understand the major movements and themes in U. S. history. Additionally, it will help students to develop critical thinking and analytical skills. Students will be required to read and write about historical topics and meeting times will be devoted to discussion of reading assignments with lecture kept to a minimum.

Honors Introductory Seminar
