The course will include a study of the development and impact of the principal nineteenth century "isms" such as conservatism, liberalism, nationalism, socialism, and Marxism. It will also deal with the world wars of the twentieth century, the rise of totalitarianism, the end of European empires, and the emergence of new states in Africa and Asia.

**HIST 2112: Honors U.S. History Since 1865** CRN:80735 Area E3 Credit Hours

This course examines the social, political, cultural, and economic history of the United States from 1865 to the present. The purpose of the course will be to discover and explore the meaning and promise of America; who made, and who claims, the promise; who is left out of the promise of America, and how and why; and to examine the contributions to American history and culture of those groups not customarily recognized by history.

**Math 2261H: Analytic Geometry and Calculus I** CRN:81782 Area A or D4 Credit Hours

Not only will this course prepare students for success -- in other math and science courses, but it will also introduce students to mathematics as a dynamic, living discipline. The topics are traditional and include limits, differentiation, and integration, as well as applications. Each topic will be investigated analytically, geometrically, and numerically whenever possible, and technology will be incorporated into the teaching/learning process.

**PHIL 2010H: Honors Fundamentals of Philosophy** CRN:80569 Area C3 Credit Hours

In an active learning setting, we will explore together the concept of VIRTUAL REALITY as it appears in philosophical debates in metaphysics and epistemology. Themes and topics will be interconnected, and will be reviewed and analyzed in cross-disciplinary writings, in film, art, music, and artificial intelligence research. Emphasis will be placed on discussion and debate, assisted by invited guests.

**POLS 2401H: Honors Introduction to Global Issues** CRN:80421 Area E3 Credit Hours

12:30-1:45 p.m. Tuesday, Thursday Instructor: Dr. Michael Baun

This course examines key global issues affecting the United States. Among the issues that are discussed are poverty, arms proliferation, the environment, and human rights. For each issue we will examine 1) the nature, extent, and sources of the problem; who is affected and what are possible solutions? 2) the role of international governmental (ie., the UN, IMF, World Bank) and non-governmental organizations (NGOs); and 3) the international politics of the issue, including efforts at finding solutions and devising appropriate international treaties and regimes.
