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### **MLIS Policy on Interlibrary Loan (ILL) Requests for Textbooks**

Textbook purchases are a standard, predictable part of the expense of pursuing a degree. The textbooks you purchase for classes are the beginning of your professional library, which you will use and expand throughout your career.

We expect that you will purchase the required textbooks for all courses that you take.

Interlibrary Loan services exist to provide short-term access to materials. Using ILL to avoid buying a textbook circumvents the intent of ILL and makes the item unavailable to other users. Requests that are inharmonious with the intent of ILL squander the time and effort of the ILL staff. Section VI of the American Library Code of Ethics states that “We do not advance private interests at the expense of library users, colleagues, or our employing institutions.”

Photocopying large sections of a textbook or printing multiple pages from a NetLibrary textbook in order to avoid buying the book is a violation of copyright. Section IV of the American Library Code of Ethics states that “We recognize and respect intellectual property rights.”
