Similar degree programs in other universities across the country have adopted the term "Workforce Education and Development" for the title of their degree programs. This change in our degree title is needed to keep our program contemporary with the evolution of our field. The current degree title reflects an outdated and narrow perspective of our field. The changes of the Option titles also reflect the same kind of evolution in terminology. The term "Career-Technical Education" is now commonly used when referring to high school or "secondary" education programs and the term "Training and Development" is commonly used in reference to employee and technical college based adult or "postsecondary" education. Part of the course will involve written and oral preparation of project data and analysis; the course therefore will enhance VSU education outcomes #4 and 7. Topics include fixation and preparation of samples for standard, low voltage, low vacuum, and high resolution SEM.

Grading: There are two parts to this course, the lecture and the laboratory, but students must understand that this course is a laboratory intensive course and that they will need to spend significant time in the laboratory.

Lecture Exams (300 pts): There will be 3 one-hour exams in this course. Each exam will cover approximately 1/3 of the lecture and reading material. Each of the three exams will be worth 100 pts.

<u>Lab Image Portfolio (100 pts.)</u>: Throughout the course, students will be assigned comparative parameters that they will use to photograph specimens. Students will be required to make a high resolution print portfolio of the comparative images before the end of class.

Research projects:

(50 pts): Since the SEM represents a tool for acquiring high quality research data, students must propose a research topic that could be studied using the equipment and procedures learned in the course. Students will research the literature and take preliminary photographs of any specimens that fit into a scientifically valid study.

Students will give a 10 min PowerPoint presentation on their proposal at the end of the course. Graduate students in BIOL 6450 will present their proposals before the end of the fourth week of class.

BIOL 6450 (100 pts): Graduate students are expected to propose a research topic early in the course to study (see previous assignment) and will develop this proposal into a research paper using original image data obtained using the instrumentation in this course. A research paper with significant literature review (citations) and original data will be submitted (50 pts) and a 30 min research presentation (50 pts.) using PowerPoint will be given to the class at the end of the course.

Oral Proficiency Exams (100 pts): Each student will orally articulate and demonstrate all procedures with specimen preparation and microscope use, following a standard checkout procedure in use in the microscopy lab.

Attendance: Students who miss class (lecture or laboratory) will lose points toward their final grade. Don't miss class.

Test/Exam Policy: Your "testing" is your performance during our (usually) 8-hour-long "live-to-tape" broadcasts. Except for announcers, who are expected to prepare themselves for game days with factual knowledge of VSU's opponents, there will be little homework in this class. Students are encouraged to watch professional basketball, baseball, and softball broadcasts to improve their appreciation of announcing, camera work, directing, producing, replay, and graphics.

One of the most important aspects of this class is to have the full crew present and ready for work on game days at the appointed time. Late students, or those with emergency absences, should call our offices to alert us. "A student who misses more than 20% of the scheduled classes of a course will be subject to receiving a failing grade in the course" (2010-2011 Undergraduate Catalog, p. 92).

MDIA 3050 Broadcast Performance and Announcing. Prerequisites: Major status, MDIA 2050, MDIA 2100, MDIA 2500, and THEA 1000; or consent of instructor.

*MDIA 4964 Sports Workshop (4 hrs.). Prerequisite: MDIA 3120K, MDIA 3150K; or consent of instructor.

The certificate program is consistent with the mission of Valdosta State University.

"The core characteristics include:

• a commitment to excellence and responsiveness within a scope of influence defined by the needs of a specific region of the state, and by particularly outstanding programs or distinctive characteristics that have a magnet effect even beyond the region."

This certificate meets the commitment to respond to regional, state, and in this case national needs. Documentation is available that there has been an explosive growth in sports broadcasting at all three levels in the U.S., and across all media platforms. Department of Labor Long-Term Occupational Projections 2006-2016 Statewide predict demand growth of 10-17% for employees with editing, reporting, and analytical skills. This certificate will provide students with the knowledge and practical experience to help fill the growing need for sports broadcasting specialists.

3. Provide evidence of the need for and interest in this certificate program. Estimate the number of students who will complete this certificate annually. Briefly explain the method used to estimate this number.

Over the past year, enrollment in the sports section of our MDIA 4962 Video Workshop has been enthusiastic and growing. Numerous students in this class and also in MDIA 3050 Broadcast Performance and Announcing have expressed a desire for specialized sports broadcast training. We have also recently expanded our production facilities, including the acquisition of a remote broadcast trailer to facilitate this increased student demand. Based on current and projected enrollment, we estimate 20-22 students will seek the Sports Broadcasting Certificate annually.

4. Estimate the annual cost of the certificate program and indicate the percentages from reallocation, student fees, grants, and outside dollars.

We estimate no additional cost. Two new courses are being proposed: MDIA 3060 Sports Announcing and Reporting, and MDIA 4964 Sports Workshop. These and the other required classes will be taught by current faculty as part of the regular course rotation.

5. Are there any special facilities needs to support the certificate program? No, current space will manage the needs of the certificate.

6. If other postsecondary institutions offer similar programs in your service area, how will the proposed program affect them? How will it affect your program? Do you plan a collaborative arrangement with another institution or entity?

There are no similar certificate programs in the state. No collaboration is anticipated.

Admission requirements are the same as for entry into our BFA degree program. In order to continue

 At this time, no other institution in the state of Georgia offers specialized training in sports broadcasting. With the proliferation of sports on cable TV, satellite TV, the Internet, and local sports talk radio stations across the country, we foresee a strong and growing need for graduates of a program of this type. This certificate program will help us to fully utilize our expanded broadcast instruction facilities. The certificate also complements our existing cross-training certificate with the

- 2. Demonstrate basic knowledge of the skills and terminologies in the practice of costume technology through class lectures, projects and lab work. (GEO 6-7, PO 2-4)
- 3. Compile a workbook through on-going research and skill development throughout the semester. (GEO 6-7, PO 2-4)
- 4. Discuss the role of the costume technologist in relation to other theatre professionals. (GEO 7, PO 2-4)

COURSE FORMAT: This course carries two semester credits.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Prerequisite: Social Dance I or instructor approval. Continuation of Social Dance developing intermediate skills for performance oriented students.

TEXT: Suggested texts: *Dance A While*, by Harris, Pittman and Waller ISBN 0-02-350581-8 and USA Dance Sport Rulebook/Edition 12, published by USA Dance Sport.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1) Demonstrate intermediate steps of well-known social/ballroom dances with relative ease. Specifically students will have four written/practical exams on American and Latin dances based on lectures, demonstrations, and practice sessions. (General Education Outcome 2,4, 6, Program Outcome, 1, 2, 3, 4)
- 2) Demonstrate all aspects of good leading and following. Each class will focus on proper etiquette, positions and steps for both males and females which will be provided through lectures, observations, discussions and practice sessions. (VSU General Education Outcome 7, Program Outcome 2, 4,)
- 3) Demonstrate terms, positions and movements used in various social/ballroom dances. Specifically students will be required to apply lectures, visual observations, and performance skills to class discussions and practical/written exams. A written paper that relates to social dance will also be required. (VSU General Education Outcome 4, 7 Program Outcome 1, 2, 4, 5)
