### ACADEMIC AFFAIRS REORGANIZATIONS/RENAMINGS

- In the College of Education and Human Services, the EDS program in Teacher Leadership has moved from the Department of Teacher Education to the Department of Leadership, Technology, and Workforce Development.
- The Office of Adult and Military Programs (AMP) has been dissolved with its responsibilities distributed to other units in both Academic Affairs and Enrollment and Student Affairs. Monica Close, AMP's Administrator Coordinator, has relocated to the Office of Academic Affairs.
- As of August 1, the Department of Applied Mathematics and Physics is now the Department of Data Science.

### CORE IMPACTS

The designated learning outcome for the Arts, Humanities, and Ethics domain (the “A” in IMPACTS) has been updated as follows: “Students will effectively analyze and interpret the meaning, cultural significance, and ethical implications of literary/philosophical texts **in English or other languages**, or of works in the visual/performing arts.

### NEW POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

- Effective August 1, all University offices including academic departments will be open Monday-Friday from 8 am-5 pm.
- At its May 15, 2025, meeting, the Board of Regents (BOR) approved a request from the Board’s Committee on Academic Affairs for all institutions within the University System of Georgia to post course syllabi on their public websites. This action aims to ensure that all students have access to the critical information necessary for informed course selection and successful academic planning. This syllabus requirement outlines essential “front matter” visibility before registration.

There will be a phase-in period for this new requirement, as described in the table below. Templates and instructions were provided to deans and department heads to distribute to impacted instructors. Each program should develop protocols for posting and ensuring that syllabi are posted in the Success Portal.



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### IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

Term	Courses Included	Posting Deadline
<b>Phase 1 Fall 2025</b>	All Core IMPACTS courses and teacher education courses within the Dewar College of Education and Human Services	At least one week before the start of Fall 2025. Classes start August 19, so syllabi must be posted by <b>August 11.</b>
<b>Phase 2 Spring 2026 and Summer 2026</b>	All Core IMPACTS courses and teacher education courses within the Dewar College of Education and Human Services	At least one week before the start of Spring 2026. <u>Spring</u> courses begin on January 13, so syllabi must be posted by <b>January 6, 2026.</b>  At least one week before the start of Summer 2026. Although there are various parts of term, <u>summer</u> classes begin on May 15, so syllabi must be posted by <b>May 8, 2026.</b>
<b>Phase 3 Fall 2026 forward</b>	All courses, all levels	Available and accessible to students before the course registration period opens. <u>Fall</u> 2026 course registration opens March 31, so syllabi must be posted by <b>March 24, 2026.</b>

What must be included in the new public syllabus?

- Course Prefix, Number, and Name
- Semester and Academic Year
- Catalog Course Description
- Course Learning Outcomes: These are the approved outcomes for the course.
- Required Course Materials: List of textbooks with ISBN, articles, lab supplies, equipment, course packs, etc. that students are required to read or reference as part of the course.
- Grading Policy: Specify how final grades will be determined, including weighting scales or points assigned to various course requirements.
- Attendance Policy
- Academic Honesty/Integrity Statement
- Core IMPACTS Statement (if applicable)



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- The BOR has also approved a new policy on “Artificial Intelligence in Academic Contexts” (<https://www.usg.edu/policymanual/section6/C2896/>). This policy requires the following:

All institutions within the University System of Georgia shall develop and implement policies or procedures that govern the ethical, responsible, and secure use of artificial intelligence (AI) in academic contexts. This ensures consistent standards and best practices throughout the system while permitting institutional flexibility to meet specific needs and circumstances. Policies, procedures, or guidance should address, at minimum, the following areas:

- Definition and scope of AI within the institution’s context
- Ethical principles and guidelines concerning the use of AI
- Accountability and responsible use of AI-generated content
- Professional development for faculty and staff, along with educational options for students regarding AI ethics, responsible use, and potential risks
- Privacy and security of student information
- Human oversight and control of AI in research processes
- Responsible use of AI in scholarly communications
- Point of contact for questions or concerns regarding the policy as well as for guidance on the use of AI

Guidance on the use of artificial intelligence should be integrated into existing academic integrity policies and codes of conduct for all enrolled students, ensuring that clear procedures are established to address violations.

Policies or procedures should align with the guidelines outlined in the Artificial Intelligence Guidelines: A USG IT Handbook Companion Guide and should be applied in accordance with the standards, procedures, and guidelines provided in the Academic & Student Affairs Handbook. Institutional policies should be submitted to the Executive Vice Chancellor and Chief Academic Officer for evaluation and approval before implementation.

A VSU taskforce is currently at work to develop an integrated policy and drafts will be circulating soon for feedback. In the meantime, VSU guidance is available at the following sites:

- Coming soon: CPOS (Curriculum, Program of Study) is part of financial aid regulations stipulating that students may only receive federal financial aid in courses that count toward their credential (i.e., within their program of study). A VSU taskforce is currently at work to develop a process through BANNER and DegreeWorks to track that students are registered for courses that count within their program and thus eligible for Title IV funds. In the future, any course substitutions will need to be completed before a student enrolls in the course.

### REVISED OR UPDATED POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

- The VSU catalog's sections on GPA have been updated to parallel the language used in students' BANNER transcripts. Since the word "cumulative" only appears on transcripts for individual terms and refers solely to the cumulative institutional average, the catalog now uses the BANNER language below to describe a student's GPA:
  - **TOTAL INSTITUTION:** includes all grades/hours earned at VSU. This total is used to determine academic standing. Students must have a 2.0 institutional GPA in order to graduate.
  - **TOTAL TRANSFER:** includes all grades/hours earned at all other institutions.
  - **OVERALL:** includes all grades/hours earned at both VSU and all other institutions students have attended. This average is NOT used to calculate GPA needed for graduation. However, it is used to calculate honors for graduation (as long as the student has at least 60 hours in residence at VSU).
  - **REGENTS GPA:** includes all grades/hours earned at both VSU and all other institutions students have attended. This GPA is not affected by VSU's grade replacement policy.
- VSU's Academic Probation and Suspension Policy has been updated to allow summer semester to count as a "sit-out" semester for a student on academic suspension.

### CELT/eLEARNING

- In May, seven VSU faculty graduated with the CELT-QEP Experiential Learning Certificate. Looking ahead to the Fall 2025 semester, four more faculty will graduate from the year-long professional development program and eight additional faculty joined the next cohort. The CELT-QEP Experiential Learning Certificate, launched last year, represents an essential step in implementing VSU's strategic goals of enhancing student success through teaching innovation. Each faculty who graduates completes an impressive 24 total course hours of training, earning continuing education units in just one year.
- BlazeVIEW's New Content Experience is coming January 2026. To prepare, throughout the summer and Fall 2025 semester, faculty can watch a 10-min video overview from CELT-eLearning to learn the benefits, as well as can see the changes to the navigation sidebar, organizing structure, and editing content in a BlazeVIEW test site. ### FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

  - A travel authorization is needed even when the Foundation is paying (so that travelers are covered for insurance purposes)
  - Employees must attest to their own travel reimbursements - a proxy can no longer do so on someone's behalf
  - Complete travel reimbursements as soon as possible upon return - the IRS allows 60 days, if after that, the reimbursement becomes taxable through payroll taxable
