The College of Nursing offers a program that leads to a Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) degree.

Master's nursing education builds on baccalaureate nursing education and prepares

nurses for specialized clinical roles. The MSN program offers three clinical tracks:

Advanced Nursing of Growing Families, Advanced Nursing of Adults, and Psychiatric/

Mental Health Nursing. Four role options are available to graduate students: Care

Manager, Nurse Practitioner, Nurse Educator, and Nurse Administrator. Graduate students must select one

clinical track and one role option. The College offers a special curriculum for Registered Nurse

applicants leading to the BNS or to both the BSN and MSN. Please contact the

college directly for information about this accelerated curriculum. Both the bachelor's degree (BSN)

and the master's degree (MSN) programs in the College of Nursing are accredited by the

Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education, One Dupont Circle, NW, Suite 530, Washington,

DC 20036. Telephone 202-887-6791; Fax 202-887-8476. Questions about

accreditation status may be addressed to this organization.

Selected Educational Outcomes

- 1. Synthesize knowledge from a variety of evidence (conceptual models and theories from nursing and related disciplines, practice wisdom and ethics) in advanced nursing practice.
- 2. Employ scientific inquiry and other ways of knowing to validate, refine, and develop knowledge relevant to advanced nursing practice and the delivery of healthcare services.

Examples of Outcome Assessments

- 1. Each student must pass a comprehensive or standardized examination which tests communication, critical thinking, advanced discipline knowledge, and the ability to synthesize.
- 2. Each student must demonstrate application of theory, practice, knowledge, critical thinking, and problem solving by completion of a thesis or project.

Master of Science in Nursing

Prior to admission to any graduate program at Valdosta State University applicants must first submit a completed application to the Graduate School. A completed application includes: official transcripts from all institutions previously attended; official test scores (GRE, MAT); completed application, fee and any additional program requirements (listed below), submitted by the admission deadline. To be considered for the preferred term all required materials must be received by the Graduate School no later than the close of business on the deadline. It is the responsibility of the applicant to allow adequate time for document submission and to ensure receipt of documents.

Admission Deadlines:

Fall Deadline: July 15

Spring Deadline: November 15

Summer Deadline: April 15

Program Admission Requirements

To be considered for admission as a Master of Science in the College of Nursing, an applicant must have:

1. graduated from a NLNAC-accredited or CCNE-accredited Bachelor

- of Science in Nursing program;
- 2. a GPA of 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 point scale;
- 3. a minimum score of 400 on the verbal section and minimum score of 3.5 on the analytical writing section of the Graduate Record Examination (GRE).

 A Miller Analogies Test (MAT) score of 400 or higher (or equivalent) will be accepted as an alternative to the GRE;
- 4. evidence of Georgia licensure as a registered nurse;
- 5. three letters of recommendation from persons whose observations of applicant's character and abilities are current. Letters of recommendation must be accompanied by the required General Graduate Recommendation Form..
- 6. Admission to regular graduate status requires completion of a statistics course and a course in advanced health assessment.

Program Considerations for Probationary Status

1. Must be recommended for Probationary status by the College of Nursing Graduate Faculty.

To be reclassified as Regular status, Probationary students must, at a minimum, maintain a 3.0 grade point average in the first 9 semester hours of graduate coursework and meet any/all contingencies and/or conditions set forth by the College of Nursing.

Program Retention, Dismissal and Readmission Policies

- 1. Students must have documentation of nalpractice insurance of \$1,000,000/\$3,000,000;
- 2. Students must have documentation of current health and accident insurance;
- 3. Students must have documentation of current certification in CPR;
- 4. Students must maintain current licensure as a Registered Nurse;
- 5. Students must provide evidence of current health status, TB testing, hepatitis-B vaccine, Varicella titer, MMR and tetanus;
- 6. Students must have a minimum grade of C in all nursing courses;
- 7. Students must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 for all graduate courses;
- 8. Students receiving two grades below "C" ("D", "F", "WF", or "U") will be dismissed from the program.
- 9. If dismissed from the program, the student must wait a minimum of two semesters and obtain approval from the academic department, before applying for readmission. The academic program reserves the right to place specific conditions and contingencies on any offer of readmission. Readmission is not guaranteed and prior academic performance and conduct in the program will be considered.
- 10. The maximum time allowed for completion of the master's degree is seven calendar years. No work completed more than seven years prior to degree completion will be accepted toward the degree, except with special permission from the student's major professor, the Dean of the College of Nursing and approval from the Dean of the Graduate School.
- 11. No more than 6 semester hours of academic work may be transferred from another institution into a master's-level graduate program. This credit must be documented in the form of an official transcript at the time of admission. Transfer credit will be evaluated after admission, by the academic department. To be eligible, credit must be no more than seven years old prior to completion of the degree.



Program Graduation Requirements:

- 1. Students must complete an application for graduation one semester prior to their expected graduation date;
- 2. A 3.0 cumulative grade point average (GPA) is required for graduation. No grade below a "C" will be credited toward the degree.

Institutional Mission

The International Business (IB) major proposal supports the missions and the strategic plans of the Langdale College of Business Administration (LCOBA), Valdosta State University (VSU), and the University System of Georgia (USG). Strategic Goal #1 of the USG's *Strategic Plan (Transforming the System, Changing Lives, and Strengthening the State*) includes "excellence in undergraduate education to meet students' 21st century educational needs." This goal speaks to the value of liberal arts education and study abroad participation. Strategic Goal #3 listed in USG's *Strategic Plan* speaks of a "Global Georgia" and to the need of Georgia to compete with other countries, the need for "programs that develop Georgia's own human capital," and a "system-level academic plan for workforce development." The International Business major proposal serves to promote and support both of the identified goals of the USG's *Strategic Plan*. The proposed program includes an increased number of liberal arts courses above the traditional business degree; in addition, the proposed program provides for study abroad opportunities as well as educational instruction in international business.

The proposed International Business major within the BBA program specifically supports two listed goals in the VSU's *Area Goals Report* of the Vice President of Academic Affairs. These goals are #9, "promotion of diversity and international programs," and #14, "create new academic programs at the graduate and undergraduate levels to meet the needs of students and the region." Finally, the proposed program serves to promote and support LCOBA's Strategic Goal #1: "expand educational opportunities for business majors," and LCOBA's Strategic Goal #2: "expand opportunities for International experiences."

The proposed program does not require a new organizational unit or additional resources. The proposed major in International Business requires the cross-discipline coordination of LCOBA and Arts and Sciences courses already offered at the undergraduate level. Only one new course will need to be added. The Department of Management may need additional state appropriations within the next five years to meet the growth in the proposed IB program. However, no additional resources are needed to begin the program.

It is not likely that a SACS visit for substantive change will be necessary. VSU is scheduled for a SACS review in 2010. The courses and delivery format are similar to others offered at the university.

Justification for the Program

For many years, the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business International (AACSB International) has been requiring the inclusion of global business education in our curriculum. Empirical studies are no longer required to confirm that today's business environment *is* global and that future business practitioners will find themselves involved in international aspects of business at an exponential rate; even small domestic businesses are already dealing with diversity among employers, suppliers, and customers.

Employers are searching for graduates with evidence of international interest and/or experience. For example, a multinational shipping company interviewed applicants here recently for a position in logistics. Global recruiters have favorably received students with study-abroad experience in business courses. The Langdale College of Business (LCOBA) recognized the trend toward international education early on, developing required courses within majors such as International Management, International Marketing, International Economics, and Multinational Corporate Finance. We find non-majors filling up these courses as electives. Faculty members have been actively involved in study-abroad programs since 1997. In 2007, LCOBA initiated its own study-abroad program in Europe and is offering the third successive opportunity in Karlsruhe, Germany during the summer of 2009.

Preliminary survey results provide evidence that our BBA students desire and can benefit from an IB program. Data to support demand for the major will be obtained through comprehensive surveys of current undergraduate majors.

STUDENTS

We estimate that 20-30 students per year will graduate from the International Business major BBA program. The majority of students will be from VSU's undergraduate BBA program. A pilot survey study of 37 students in a lower-level business course provides preliminary evidence to the desire for an IB major. Approximately 78 percent expressed an interest in a Study Abroad program.

BUDGET

There is no additional steady-state cost for the IB program. The proposed major in IB requires the cross-discipline coordination of LCOBA and Arts and Sciences courses already offered at the undergraduate level. Only one new course offering is required. Additional student fees, grants, and outside dollars will not be required. Start-up costs will be in the form of faculty time. Additional funds above those already paid for faculty salaries and benefits are not required.

FACILITIES

Additional facilities will not be required.

CURRICULUM AND DELIVERY

The proposed International Business major is similar to other programs currently offered at other institutions. This major integrates an additional knowledge base within other functional areas of business and will serve to develop students' foreign language, critical thinking, problem-solving, oral and written communications, and technology skills within the

field of IB. The proposed program does not require new or special student services. The program will serve all students in VSU's undergraduate program.

COLLABORATION

Similar programs in our service area do not exist. Known programs exist at Georgia Southern, Kennesaw State and University of Georgia. These programs were studied and evaluated to develop VSU's proposed program.

Institutional Mission

Valdosta State University's (VSU) mission is to provide educational services to the South Georgia region. As a regional institution, VSU responds to the educational needs of the 41 southern counties. The proposed Master of Accountancy (MAcc) program aligns with the mission of VSU and the needs of the South Georgia region by providing an advanced accounting degree to graduates of the baccalaureate program who seek to meet the Georgia State Board of Accountancy 150-credit hour requirement for licensure as a certified public accountant (CPA).

The proposed MAcc program does not alter VSU's mission nor does the proposed program change VSU's strategic plan. The proposal supports both the mission and the strategic plan. The proposed program meets VSU's strategic plan by addressing Strategic Goal 14 (FY09) of the Vice President of Academic Affairs: To create new academic programs at the graduate and undergraduate levels to meet the needs of students and the region. The program addresses the Langdale College of Business Administration's Strategic Goal 1: Expanding educational opportunities for business majors and the Department of Accounting and Finance's Action Plan No. 6: Formulate a workable plan to reactivate the Masters of Accountancy program at VSU.

The proposed program does not require a new organizational unit or additional resources. The proposed program realigns some courses currently taught at the undergraduate level to the graduate level in addition to creating new courses. The current faculty and classroom space used in the undergraduate program will be used at the graduate level. The Department of Accounting & Finance may need additional state appropriations within the next five years to meet the growth in both the undergraduate accounting and proposed MAcc programs. However, no additional resources are needed to begin the program.

It is not likely that a SACS visit for substantive change will be necessary. VSU is scheduled for a SACS review in 2010. The courses and delivery format are similar to others offered at the university.

Mission of the Proposed Master of Accountancy Program

The MAcc will provide students additional education that further enhances students' analytical, communication, research, and technology skills. The MAcc will also provide further preparation for their accounting careers, the CPA exam and licensure requirements for the CPA certificate.

NEED

The Georgia State Board of Accountancy requires 150 semester hours for licensure as a certified public accountant (CPA). There is an increase in the number of accounting graduates who remain at VSU in order to complete the additional hours for CPA licensure. Many of these students desire a graduate degree, but they do not view VSU's MBA program as a viable option because they want to finish in one year. VSU's MBA is a two-year part-time program. Instead of going elsewhere to enroll in different MAcc or MBA program, these students are staying at VSU for an extra year to take 30 semester hours of random undergraduate-level business courses. Their behavior is evidence of significant student demand for a one-year, full-time MAcc program on the VSU campus.

Data to support demand for the MAcc program will be obtained through surveys of current accounting majors as well as regional CPA firms. Results from a preliminary survey of 37 accounting (predominantly) seniors currently enrolled in VSU's undergraduate accounting courses reveals that 76 percent of these students plan to sit for the CPA exam. Seventy-percent of the entire sample of students indicates they would apply for VSU's MAcc program if it were available.

The CPA firms in VSU's service region support the proposed MAcc program. In September 2008, the new accounting and finance honorary society (Beta Alpha Psi) hosted an event where nine local and regional CPA firms were provided the opportunity to meet with our students. Representatives from the firms stated their overwhelming support for a MAcc program. They also stated the need for students to have completed 150 semester credit hours before leaving school. Because of the high probability of work related travel and inhouse training, these firms have a strong preference to hire graduates that have already achieved the 150 hours required for CPA licensure. They report a very poor experience with students who have been hired with only 120 semester credit hours and then try to combine night-school or expensive online graduate programs with work.

STUDENTS

We estimate that 20-25 students per year would graduate from a VSU MAcc program. Currently there are 271 accounting majors and the majority of the MAcc students will be from VSU's undergraduate BBA Accounting program.

In spring 2007, students requested that the accounting and finance department petition Beta Alpha Psi, a national accounting and finance honorary society, to begin a chapter. Beta Alpha Psi was founded in 1919. The VSU chapter has approximately 30 members. While still in the petitioning chapter stage, the chapter received the Distinguished Chapter award at the August 2008 national meeting. The VSU chapter has been granted full member status and will hold chapter initiation in February 2009. We believe these (and future) Beta Alpha Psi students will make up the core of the MAcc program.

BUDGET

There is no additional steady-state cost for the MAcc program. Course coverage is 60 percent from course reallocation and existing MBA courses. Four courses will be new. Additional student fees, grants, and outside dollars will not be required for the proposed MAcc program. Start-up costs will be in the form of faculty time. The proposed program does not require new or special student services. The Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminal Justice offers three Master of Science degrees, one with a major in criminal justice (MSCJ) having both a thesis and non-thesis option, one with a major in sociology (MS SOC) with a focus on applied sociology, and one with a major in marriage and family therapy (MS MFT). The Applied and Clinical Sociology Graduate Program is accredited by the Commission on Applied and Clinical Sociology. The Marriage and Family Therapy Program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Marriage and Family Therapy Training and Education (COAMFTE) of the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy (AAMFT).

MASTER OF SCIENCE WITH A MAJOR IN CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Selected Educational Outcomes

Students completing requirements for the Master of Science degree with a major in criminal justice should demonstrate a mastery of the following:

- 1. an understanding of major criminological theories, their strengths and weaknesses, their role in explaining crime and delinquency, and their role in informing public policy;
- 2. a familiarity with the structure and function of systems of criminal justice in the United States and in other countries;
- 3. the use and application of scientific research methods to the study of crime as well as to solving crimes:
- 4. the integration of criminal justice theory and research findings with criminal justice practice;
- 5. an understanding of the development of contemporary criminal justice issues in modern societies and how such issues may be informed by systematic research and analysis.

Outcome Assessments

Educational outcomes for the Master of Science degree with a major in criminal justice will be assessed in the following ways:

- 1. systematic analysis of student examinations and research papers from courses;
- 2, surveys of students or alumni from the program;
- 3. baseline data from other comparable programs in the university will be compared to data based on students in the program;
- 4. regular meetings among program faculty to assess courses and student performance;
- 5. periodic review of all theses and area papers written in a given assessment period and evaluation of related student performance.

Prior to admission to any graduate program at Valdosta State University applicants must first submit a completed application to the Graduate School. A completed application includes: official transcripts from all institutions previously attended; official test scores (GRE); completed application, fee and any additional program requirements (listed below) submitted by the admission deadline. To be considered for your preferred term all required materials must be received by the Graduate School no later than the close of business on the deadline. It is the responsibility of the applicant to allow adequate time for document submission and to ensure receipt of documents.

Program Admission Requirements: To be considered for admission as a Master of Science in Criminal Justice graduate student in the Department of Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminal Justice, an applicant must:

- 1. have an undergraduate degree from a regionally accredited institution; students who do not have an undergraduate degree in criminal justice may be required to audit undergraduate criminal law and criminological theory courses before enrolling in graduate level work in these areas, as determined by the Criminal Justice Graduate Admissions Committee;
- 2. have a minimum 2.75 grade point average on all undergraduate work for which grades were assigned.
- 3. have completed one undergraduate course in basic statistics and one course in research methodology. Students may apply for a waiver of these requirements and demonstrate proficiency by passing an examination. Students who have not completed these requirements or who do not receive a waiver must complete a statistics course and a research methods course without graduate credit before formal admission to the criminal justice graduate program;
- 4. have a minimum combined score of 800 on the verbal and quantitative sections of the Graduate Record Examination (GRE). This combined GRE score must include a minimum of 400 points earned on the verbal section of the exam. In addition, a GRE writing assessment score of 3.5 is required. For those students who took the GRE prior to October 2002, the required score for admission is 800 as a combination of any two of the three sections.
- submit a two-page essay relating the reasons why they wish to pursue graduate study in criminal justice at Valdosta State University and summarizing their career goals, relevant past experience, academic awards, and recognition of achievements.
- 6. have two letters of recommendation written by faculty members who have taught the candidate in an academic class. Letters must be accompanied by the required Graduate School Recommendation Form.

Program Considerations for Probationary Status

Applicants who have achieved the minimum GRE scores but who do not have the minimum 2.75 undergraduate grade point average may be considered for probationary status. Applicants must:

- 1. have a minimum 2.50 undergraduate grade point average,
- 2. <u>have at least three years of post-undergraduate degree experience working in a criminal justice or other social service agency</u>
- be able to pass a probationary admission essay examination. The examination will be held in the
 departmental offices and will be graded by the Criminal Justice Graduate Admissions Committee.
 Probationary status applicants may also be asked to provide a resume and related references. All other
 probationary admission requirements and standards set by the Valdosta State University Graduate School
 must also be met.

To be considered for Irregular status, applicants must:

- 1. Hold an undergraduate degree from a regionally accredited institution at the point of application;
- 2. have submitted official transcripts from all institutions previously attended;
- 3. Submit a completed Irregular Waiver to the Graduate School.

The application, fee, waiver and all transcripts must be received by the Graduate School prior to the application deadline for the application term.

Program Retention, Dismissal and Readmission Policies

- 1. A 3.00 cumulative grade point average (GPA) is required for graduation. No grade below "C" will be credited toward the M.S. degree with a major in Criminal Justice.
- 2. Students must receive a grade of "B" or better in all core courses.
- 3. Students will be dismissed from the MSCJ program if they accumulate three or more academic deficiency points. A grade of "C" in any core course will not be counted toward the MSCJ degree and equals one deficiency point. A grade of "C" in any non-core course will be credited toward the MSCJ degree but also equals one deficiency point. A grade of "D" or "U" will not be credited toward the MSCJ degree and equals two deficiency points. A grade of "F" or "WF" (neither of which will be credited toward the MSCJ degree) equals three deficiency points.
- 4. After a minimum of three semesters, a student may apply for readmission. Readmission is not guaranteed. The student must also retake only those courses with deficiencies until the number of deficiency points is fewer than or equal to two. The student cannot take a class more than three times or apply for readmission more than twice.
- 5. No more than 6 semester hours of academic work may be transferred from another institution into a master's-level graduate program. Transfer credit will be evaluated after admission by the academic department. To be eligible, credit must be no more than seven years old prior to completion of the degree.
- 6. The maximum time allowed for completion of the master's degree is seven calendar years. No work completed more than seven years prior to degree completion will be accepted toward the degree, except with special permission from the student's major professor and the Head of the Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminal Justice and approval from the Dean of the Graduate School.



Program Admission Requirements: To be considered for admission as a Master of Science in Sociology graduate student in the Department of Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminal Justice, an applicant must:

 have an undergraduate degree from a regionally accredited institution. An undergraduate degree in sociology is not mandatory. However, students without an undergraduate degree in sociology should show evidence via an official transcript of the successful completion of an undergraduate sociological theory

- course, an undergraduate statistics course, and an undergraduate social science research methods course. If the students cannot show such evidence, the sociology faculty shall meet and discuss the candidate's likely success. If necessary the candidate will be asked to enroll in these courses at VSU.
- 2. have a minimum combined score of 800 on the verbal and quantitative sections of the Graduate Record Examination (GRE), or a minimum score of 389 on the Miller Analogies Test (MAT).
- 3. submit a copy of a sample of written work submitted for credit in an upper division or graduate level course in Sociology or their current major field. If an applicant cannot locate a sample of written work that was submitted for credit, then the applicant shall contact the M.S. Sociology Coordinator for directions on writing a personal goal statement. This personal goal statement will serve as an acceptable substitute for the sample of written work. The writing sample (or personal goal statement) should be sent to the *Graduate School* following the established admission timelines state above.
- 4. have two letters of recommendations written by faculty members who have taught the candidate in an academic class. Letters must be accompanied by the required Graduate School Recommendation Form.

Program Considerations for Probationary Status

Students with lower than previously specified GRE or MAT scores may be considered for probationary status. A faculty committee will review letters of recommendation and writing sample and may ask for additional information to make a decision to admit a student on probationary status.

To be reclassified as Regular status, Probationary students must, at a minimum, maintain a 3.0 grade point average in the first 9 semester hours of graduate coursework and meet any/all contingencies and/or conditions set forth by the Master of Science in Sociology department.

This program does not admit non-degree or irregular status students.

To be considered for Irregular status, applicants must:

- 1. Hold an undergraduate degree from a regionally accredited institution at the point of application;
- 2. have submitted official transcripts from all institutions previously attended;
- 3. Submit a completed Irregular Waiver to the Graduate School.

The application, fee, waiver and all transcripts must be received by the Graduate School prior to the application deadline for the application term.

Program Retention, Dismissal and Readmission Policies

- 1. A 3.00 cumulative grade point average (GPA) is required for graduation. No grade below "C" will be credited toward the M.S. degree with a major in sociology.
- 2. Students will be dismissed from the M.S. program if they accumulate three or more academic deficiency points. A grade of "C" (while it will be credited toward the M.S. degree) equals one deficiency point. A grade of "D" (which will not be credited toward the M.S. degree) equals two deficiency points. A grade of "F," "U," or "WF" (none of which will be credited toward the M.S. degree) equals three deficiency points.
- 3. A student must apply for readmission. Readmission is not guaranteed. A student must wait a minimum of two semesters before applying for readmission. If the student has deficiencies in core courses (SOCI 7011, 7012, 7021, 7022, or 7050), the student must retake only those core courses that have deficiencies until the number of deficiency points is fewer than or equal to two. If the student has deficiencies in elective hours (whether sociology courses or courses from any other program), the student shall take

only SOCI electives until the number of deficiency points is fewer than three. No elective hours outside of sociology will be accepted to make up deficiency points.

4. No more than 6 semester hours of academic work may be transferred from another institution into a master's-level graduate program. Transfer credit will be evaluated after admission by the academic department. To be eligible, credit must be no more than seven years old prior to completion of the degree.

5. The maximum time allowed for completion of the master's degree is seven calendar years. No work completed more than seven years prior to degree completion will be accepted toward the degree, except with special permission from the student's major professor and the Head of the Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminal Justice and approval from the Dean of the Graduate School.

Program Graduation Requirements

- 1. Students must complete an application for graduation one semester prior to their expected graduation date.
- 2. Students must have a 3.0 cumulative grade point average (GPA). No grade below a "C" will be credited toward the degree.
- 3. To receive a Master of Science degree with a major in sociology, students must successfully complete the core requirements and develop competence in an area of sociological practice, as outlined below.
- 4. Students must pass a written comprehensive examination.
- 5. Students must fulfill the application of knowledge requirement, which is achieved by successfully completing six credit hours of SOC1 7800 Sociological Practice.

The Department of Psychology and Counseling provides programs of study at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. At the undergraduate level, the department offers B.A. and B.S. degrees with a major in psychology.

At the graduate level, the department offers the M.S. degree in clinical/counseling or industrial/organizational psychology. Graduates are prepared to perform services in mental health settings, businesses, community colleges, government or industries, which require graduate training in psychology at the subdoctoral level.

The department also offers programs leading to the M.Ed. and Ed.S. degrees with a major in school counseling and the Ed.S. degree with a major in school psychology. These programs train and endorse program graduates specifically for employment in the public school setting. Students in these programs are required to satisfy all Georgia Professional Standards Commission requirements for certification as a component part of the degree programs. These programs are approved by the Georgia Professional Standards Commission and the College of Education is accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE). The Ed.S. program with a major in school psychology is also approved by the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP).

Department faculty instruct courses and serve on doctoral committees for students enrolled in the College of Education doctoral programs. All department faculty hold the doctorate. Information concerning these programs, their admission requirements (which differ by degree program), continuing education, and other services offered by the department can be obtained by contacting the department.

MASTER OF SCIENCE WITH A MAJOR IN CLINICAL/COUNSELING PSYCHOLOGY

The faculty serves the citizens of the region and state by offering instruction and services designed to improve the quality of life. Program graduates are prepared to work in community counseling and mental health centers. The faculty offers individualized training to assure the public of qualified, responsible, and appropriately credentialed individuals who provide assessment, consultation and counseling. Program graduates interested in pursuing further training and education in clinical/counseling psychology are given a solid foundation for efforts to achieve other related advanced degrees.

Selected Educational Outcomes

- 1. Program graduates will be able to use the scientific method to critically evaluate research methodology, statistics, and conclusions in current clinical/counseling psychology literature.
- 2. Program graduates will demonstrate a comprehensive understanding of the knowledge, research, and theories appropriate to the M.S. in clinical/counseling psychology by developing written responses to program questions.

Program Retention, Dismissal and Readmission Policies

Retention Policy

The university faculty has the duty and responsibility to provide the public with ethical and competent practitioners. To achieve these goals, the university adopts selective admissions, retention, and graduation policies. The delivery of psychological and counseling services, especially of a clinical nature, in schools, mental health settings, and organizations requires the practitioner to meet both academic and professional standards of competence. Accordingly, the faculty of the Department of Psychology and Counseling has adopted requirements that candidates must meet in order to graduate from one of the department's graduate programs. These requirements include that candidates must demonstrate professionally appropriate behavior and may be terminated for academic and non-academic reasons. Recommendations must reflect the ability, interest, and motivation of the applicant to be successful in the program of study and the career field.

To be reclassified as Regular status, Probationary students must, at a minimum, maintain a 3.0 grade point average in the first 9 semester hours of graduate coursework and meet any/all contingencies and/or conditions set forth by the Department of Psychology and Counseling.

This program does not admit students with irregular or non-degree status.

Program Retention, Dismissal and Readmission Policies

Retention Policy

The university faculty has the duty and responsibility to provide the public with ethical and competent practitioners. To achieve these goals, the university adopts selective admissions, retention, and graduation policies. The delivery of psychological and counseling services, especially of a clinical nature, in schools, mental health settings, and organizations requires the practitioner to meet both academic and professional standards of competence. Accordingly, the faculty of the Department of Psychology and Counseling has adopted requirements that candidates must meet in order to graduate from one of the department's graduate programs. These requirements include that candidates must demonstrate professionally appropriate behavior and may be terminated for academic and non-academic reasons. The complete policy is available at the following website http://www.valdosta.edu/coe/psychology/retention.shtml.

Academic progress is determined by grades earned in the program of study for which the candidate is currently enrolled, as well as performance on comprehensive examinations as required by the specific program.

- 1. Candidates will be dismissed from the program if they accumulate three or more academic deficiency points. A grade of "C," while credited toward the degree, will result in one deficiency point. A grade of "D" is two deficiency points; a grade of "F" or "WF" or "U" is three deficiency points;
- 2. If a candidate wishes to withdraw from a class with a grade of "WP," it is the candidate's responsibility to initiate and complete the withdrawal process prior to the midterm deadline. "WP" grades do not affect academic deficiency points or grade point average;
- 3. The maximum time allowed for completion of the master's degree is seven calendar years. No work completed more than seven years prior to degree completion will be accepted toward the degree, except with special permission from the student's major professor and the Dean of the College of Education and approval from the Dean of the Graduate School;
- 4. No more than 6 semester hours of academic work may be transferred from another institution into a master's-level graduate program. This credit must be documented in the form of an official transcript at the time of admission. Transfer credit will be evaluated after admission, by the academic department. To be eligible, credit must be no more than seven years old prior to completion of the degree.
- 5. If dismissed from the program, the student must wait a minimum of two semesters before applying for readmission. The academic program reserves the right to place specific conditions and contingencies on any offer of readmission. Readmission is not guaranteed and prior academic performance and conduct in the program will be considered.

Program Graduation Requirements:

- 1. Students must complete an application for graduation one semester prior to their expected graduation date.
- 2. Students must have a 3.0 cumulative grade point average (GPA) is required for graduation. No grade below a "C" will be credited toward the degree.
- 3. Students are required to successfully complete a comprehensive electronic portfolio that requires the application of the knowledge gained in a series of courses. The portfolio will be assessed by a committee of faculty, using established criteria.
