**Bio 2652 Human Anatomy and Physiology II**

**Prerequisite:** Biol 2651. A continuation of human anatomy and general physiological principles with emphasis on the following: cardiovascular, lymphatic, respiratory, digestive, excretory and reproductive systems, plus development.

**Course Goals:** This course builds on the anatomical information discussed in BIOL 2651 by examining all the major human physiological systems. Educational outcomes associated with this course include nos. 1, 3, and 4 as specified by the VSU Biology Department and nos. 3, 4, 5, and 7 of the general outcomes specified by the University.

**Section I Academic Integrity Conduct Code**

**Academic integrity is the responsibility of all VSU faculty and students. Faculty members should promote academic integrity by including clear instruction on the components of academic integrity and clearly defining the penalties for cheating and plagiarism in their course syllabi. Students are responsible for knowing and abiding by the Academic Integrity Policy as set forth in the Student Code of Conduct and the faculty members' syllabi. All students are expected to do their own work and to uphold a high standard of academic ethics.**

**A. Academic Integrity Violations**

Cheating and plagiarism are academic integrity violations. Additional violations may be added as deemed appropriate. The following academic integrity violations are not to be considered all-inclusive:

1. No student shall use or attempt to use unauthorized materials or devices to aid in achieving a better grade on a component of a class.
2. No student shall receive or give or attempt to receive or give assistance not authorized by the instructor in the preparation of an essay, laboratory report, examination or other assignment included in any academic course.

- Incorporating the words or ideas of an author into one's paper without giving the author due credit, e.g., when direct quotations are used, they must be indicated, and when the ideas of another are incorporated in the paper they must be appropriately acknowledged.

### **Lecture**

**Attendance:** Being an online course, there will not be any specific times that you have to watch lectures but you are expected to watch lectures on a daily basis and keep up with the material. This is a very fast paced course and you will potentially have assignments due daily.

**Grading:** Nine (9) lecture exams will be given during the semester and a **cumulative final exam**. There must be a valid reason or the make-up exam will be forfeited.** The instructor is the final judge of what is an acceptable excuse.
