**Course Description:**

**Bio 2252 Human Anatomy and Physiology II**

**Prerequisite:** **BIOL 2251.** A continuation of human anatomy and general physiological principles with emphasis on the following: cardiovascular, lymphatic, respiratory, digestive, excretory and reproductive systems, plus development.

**Course Objectives:** This course builds on the anatomical information discussed in BIOL 2251 by examining all the major human physiological systems. Educational outcomes associated with this course include nos. 1, 3, and 4 as specified by the VSU Biology Department and nos. 3, 4, 5, and 7 of the general outcomes specified by the University.

**Text and Lab Manual:** Connect APR & PHILS for Anatomy & Physiology: An Integrative Approach, McKinley, 4<sup>th</sup> edition. Publisher – McGraw Hill.

**Lab Manual:** **Optional.** Laboratory Manual for Human Anatomy and Physiology, 3<sup>rd</sup> ed., Smith and Loughry, Burgess Publishing. All lab exercises are also available from the course website. (I don't recommend the manual)

**Laboratory Kit:** Can be purchased from VSU Bookstore if you do not already own one; must be brought to each lab dissection class.

**Laboratory Specimens:** You will not need to purchase a sheep heart and fetal pig for lab dissection. They will be provided for you. Gloves will be provided for you as long as they are not wasted and the use abused.
