Valdosta-Lowndes Literacy Project Ceremony

In This Edition Valdosta-Lowndes Literacy

The Valdosta State University Speech-Language Hearing Clinic began the Valdosta-Lowndes Literacy Project in the fall of 2019 with financial support from the Scottish Rite Foundation of Georgia and the Albany Valley.

On January 26, 2022, a ribboncutting ceremony was hosted at the home of the Valdosta-Lowndes Literacy Project, the Boys and Girls Club of Valdosta. Valdosta mayor Scott James was in attendance, and proclaimed January 26th as Valdosta-Lowndes Literacy Day.

The event was held at the Valdosta-Lowndes Chamber of Commerce. Valdosta City Schools Superintendent Dr. Todd Carson, representatives from the Boys and Girls Club, students and faculty in our department, as well as members and trustees of the Scottish Rite Foundation of Georgia were also present at the event.



Associate Professor Dr. Matthew Carter said, "We have been trying to get this off the ground for two years, but the pandemic forced us to shift our resources. After much groundwork, we are finally ready to get it started. This program is an expansion of the literacy screenings and testing that we do for the school systems. It is certainly important to identify those who are struggling with learning to read and that is what we hope to accomplish with our screening. However, simply knowing who is struggling and who is not doesn't solve anyone's problems. We want to be solutions oriented and we could think of no better way than to roll up our sleeves and to meet our neighbors within the community. This program is very much in line with our philosophy of taking the services to the people where they are instead of asking them to come to us."

As part of the groundwork, literacy screenings were provided to many children who attend the Boys and Girls Club. Children who did not pass the screenings were recruited to participate in the program. Graduate students will be providing the services during their clinical practicum.

The Dollar General Literacy Grant



SPEAK OUT! Parkinson's Voice Project Grant

Our Valdosta State University Speech and Hearing Clinic was awarded a grant from the Parkinson Voice Project! This grant provides free "SPEAK OUT! & LOUD Crowd training" to our graduate students for individuals seeking skilled speech-language intervention for Parkinson's disease.

The SPEAK OUT! Program typically consists of twelve individual speech therapy sessions.



SPEAK OUT! teaches individuals with Parkinson's to speak with intent using complete speech, voice, and cognitive exercises using a specialized workbook provided by Parkinson's Voice Project. SPEAK OUT! program emphasizes speaking with intent and converts speech from an automatic function to an intentional act.

Once the patient completes the SPEAK OUT! program, daily home practice and ongoing follow-up is necessary for continued success. The LOUD Crowd consists of weekly group sessions where SPEAK OUT! Exercises are performed and individuals can practice speaking with intent whilst having accountability, education, and support with other participants.

Research is showing that this program may be more effective on dysarthria than the Lee Silverman Voice Treatment (Behrman et al., 2020).



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Nationwide, elementary schools are struggling to provide children with the resources that are needed to develop age-appropriate reading skills. To combat this problem on a local level, our department has partnered with a local school system to identify those who are likely to struggle with reading. During the 2021-2022 school year, students from the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders were able to screen 845 kindergarten students in the Lowndes County School system.



These children were screened for early warning signs of language and literacy disorders, such as dyslexia, by using a highly reliable and valid screening tool that can predict future reading abilities with high levels of accuracy. The results from the screening tool are used to guide curriculum and to direct individualized instruction.

Not only is a valuable service being provided to the hundreds of children who were screened, but over a hundred VSU CSD students were able to participate in this experiential learning opportunity where they were able to practice their craft within a communitybased setting.



These efforts were possible based upon generous financial donations from the Scottish-Rite Foundation.
