Catalog Description

Prerequisites: MLIS 7100 or consent of the instructor. Examination of processes and resources used to provide reference services in the humanities disciplines. The fields of art, communications, literature, history, languages, linguistics, music, philosophy, religion, and the theater will be considered.

MLIS Program Objectives (PO)

Graduates of the VSU MLIS Program will:

- <u>PO 1</u>. Perform administrative, service, and technical functions of professional practice in libraries and information centers.
- PO 2. Use existing and emerging technologies to meet needs in libraries and information centers.
- PO 3. Integrate relevant research to enhance work in libraries and information centers.
- PO 4. Demonstrate professionalism in their work in libraries and information centers.

MLIS 7130 is designed primarily to fulfill PO 1, however, use of technologies, particularly an application of your ability to locate materials through online web searches and in electronic bibliographies is an integral part of this course (PO 2). You will also be expected to relate research on the information-seeking behaviors of humanists to your assignments (PO 3), and your projects must be formatted in a professional manner (PO 4).

Those of you who were accepted into the VSU MLIS Program in Fall 2013 are required to complete a course that contains a Collection Development Project. The Selector's Guide in this course fulfills that requirement. If you plan to count your Selector's Guide to complete that requirement, please inform Dr. Ondrusek of that at the start of the semester. You will need a subscription to LiveText and must submit the final copy of the Selector's Guide to your LiveText account. Other guided electives that include the required Collection Development Project are: MLIS 7400, MLIS 7440, MLIS 7150, and students in the Youth Services Track or Dual Program may count MLIS 7420. If you submitted a copy of the CDP to LiveText for a previous course, you need *not* submit your Selector's Guide from this course.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLO)

Students will:

- SLO 1. Utilize a variety of print and electronic resources in the humanities.
- SLO 2. Assess research needs in the humanities and describe how information professionals may meet those needs.
- SLO.3. Utilize a working knowledge of the literature in each of the selected disciplines of the humanities.
- SLO 4. Identify appropriate resources for humanities collection development.

Introduce Yourself Discussion Board

Required, not graded.

Discussion 1 Exercise

15 points

Assemble an annotated, illustrated list of primary sources that a historian would use 100 years from now to recreate something about <u>your</u> life. Post your personal primary source "snapshot" list to Discussion 1 as an attachment. You may use Word or PowerPoint to create it. View each other's snapshots.

Discussion Board 2 (SLO 2) 20 points

>Part 1: From the readings, identify at least 10 aspects of humanities research that librarians need to consider when responding to humanities scholars or students, and/or when developing a humanities collection. Include material for the assigned chapters in the textbook and two (2) additional articles from the reading list provided. Post your essay to Discussion 2 as an attachment.

>Part 2: Read and respond to at least two essays submitted by your classmates. Respond using the "Reply" tool.

Material Examination Exercises

(SLO 3) 25 points

Use the "Resources List" posted in Weeks 6-10 folders (5 Exercises in all) to conduct examinations of the resources on those lists. Complete the Follow-Up Exercise that accompanies each examination. Submit to the Dropbox.

Selector's Guide

(SLO 1, SLO 4) 15 points

Create a Selector's Guide on a humanities sub-topic of your choice. A draft of your Selector's Guide will be due about mid-way between Week 11 and the end of Week 13. Submit to the Dropbox. Submit to the Dropbox.

Self Development Project

(SLO 1) 15 points

Complete a project related to your Selector's Guide – must be approved by your professor.

If you are unsure about the parameters of an assignment, ask for clarification.

Technical Requirements

All class materials will be placed on a password-protected Web site using the BlazeVIEW course management program. Login using your old BlazeVIEW ID and the new Single Sign-On (SSO) password.

To meet all class requirements, you should be prepared to: (1) open and save or print all documents that are required background reading - this requires the Adobe Acrobat Reader on your computer; (2) view all PowerPoints placed on the course BlazeVIEW site – these are saved to **Powerpoint 97-2003** and will open in all higher versions; (3) participate in Live Classroom sessions – login links and instructions will be available through your BlazeVIEW course homepage; (4) check discussion groups as needed; and (5) keep electronic backup copies of each assignment and project you submit.

Unless otherwise stated, assignments must be submitted using a word processing program compatible with Microsoft (MS) Word. BlazeVIEW accepts attached documents in **MS Word 97-2003 or higher**. If you are using WordPerfect or sharing documents with classmates who have a different version of Word, save your documents in Rich Text Format (rtf). The instructor returns documents that cannot be opened on VSU equipment. Documents that cannot be opened on VSU equipment will be returned to you for reformatting.

Late or Missing Submissions and Grace Periods

Most graded assignments are due Monday, 11:59 pm. You have a one-day grace period to submit assignments for full credit. Assignments received after Tuesday, 11:59 pm, lose points. Completely skipping an assignment is not acceptable in graduate school. To be eligible to receive an A in this course requires completing <u>every</u> assignment and submitting within the specified deadlines. Opportunities for revising an assignment are granted at the discretion of the instructor. Requests for extra credit to make up for missed assignments or low grades are not an option.

A grade of Incomplete is not an option unless a non-academic situation interferes with completion of assignments <u>after</u> the option to withdraw without academic penalty passed (March 6). A petition for an Incomplete must be submitted with documentation to the professor at the time an assignment is missed. Withdrawal from a course after March 6 requires a petition to the VSU Dean of Student Affairs.
