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Description

Examination of processes and resources used to provide reference services in the humanities disciplines. The fields of history, literature and language, music, philosophy, religion, and the visual and performing arts will be considered. Prerequisite: MLIS 7000 or consent of the instructor.

Objectives and Outcomes

At the end of the course, students will be able to

- Explain humanities information-seeking behavior, including the role of technology
- Identify key factors that affect accessing information in humanities disciplines
- Discuss the impact of digitization in the humanities
- Utilize print and electronic resources in the humanities
- Identify the characteristics of the literature and the structure of information in the humanities
- Assess information needs in the humanities and describe how reference librarians can meet those needs using effective search strategies
- Write research guides intended for undergraduate courses in the humanities

Assignment Synopses

- **Research Paper**: A scholarly essay that synthesizes assigned readings on humanities information-seeking behavior, including the use of technology
- Course Guide: A research guide to reference sources for a humanities course
- **Reality Reference/Test**: Ready reference questions that require identifying humanities sources in the text, history chapter, and on the Internet and that ask for short answers pertaining to additional course material
