Course Philosophy	This course began as a means to describe Web related documents and has since expanded into something that addresses all digital documents. It is an introduction to metadata and the various schemes developed to manage digital documents. We will avoid discussions of "what is a document" and of "what is an author." You will have had all of this in Foundations and other courses. We will assume we all accept the notion of documents created in digital format or transcribed into digital format. I will not spend time discussing cataloging rules a la AACR2 except insofar as they are pertinent to how one populates MARC or Dublin Core, etc. This course touches on some of the earlier efforts to manage Web pages, to include "spam-indexing." It's still around, only much more subtly than it was in say 1996. Presentations of metadata come in all sorts of flavors. I offer one; you will see that your textbook takes a different tact. All the better.
