Course Description

Required for partial fulfillment of the requirements for the MLIS degree. Emphasis will be on synthesis of knowledge, honing writing and presentation skills, and creating a professional development plan.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Synthesize knowledge gained throughout the course of study and apply that knowledge to the consideration of current professional issues.
- 2. Make an effective professional presentation.
- 3. Write a paper of publishable quality.
- 4. Create a professional development plan.
- 5. Navigate the job hunting process.
- 6. Articulate personal professional goals.

Course Prerequisite or Corequisite: Taken during the final semester of study

Required Text

Rubin, Richard E. *Foundations of Library and Information Science*. New York: Neal Schuman. The edition you used in Foundations will be fine.

Assignments

Major presentation and paper: You will prepare a conference-style presentation and a paper of publishable quality on a topic of your choice, with the topic subject to instructor approval. Presentations will last 15-20 minutes, with 10 minutes for questions and discussion. Paper length and style will depend on topic and on requirements of appropriate publication venues. Presentation and final paper are due at Class #4. "Progress conference" with instructor at Class #2. "Dry run" of presentation and draft of final paper due at Class #3.

Current Issues Discussions: Due at Class #2. You will moderate class discussions on two current issues in LIS. These will be topics that have appeared in either the LIS or popular literature during the past year and ones on which people of good will have disagreed. Topics will be assigned at Class #1. For each of your topics, you will identify pieces of published literature that state all sides of the issue and you will prepare two or three questions to guide the discussion.

Professional Development Plan: Each student will create and record a personal plan for professional development. For students who need to seek employment, this will include a detailed job-hunting plan. For all students, this will include plans for solidifying and updating their professional knowledge in the two-year period following graduation. Submit via WebCT Vista no later than Class #2.

Reflection on MLIS Experience: Each student will prepare an essay that reflects on and evaluates his or her experience with the MLIS degree program. The essay will include the student's determination of strengths and weaknesses within the program. Submit via WebCT Vista no later than Class #3.

Portfolio: You will update, present and discuss your portfolio. Feedback will be provided by the instructor and classmates. Discussion and sharing of portfolios at Class #1; updated portfolios due at Class #3.
