Course Description

Required for partial fulfillment of the requirements for the MLIS degree. Emphasis will be on synthesis of knowledge, honing writing and presentation skills, and creating a professional development plan.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Synthesize knowledge gained throughout the course of study and apply that knowledge to the consideration of current professional issues.
- 2. Make an effective professional presentation.
- 3. Write a paper of publishable quality.
- 4. Create a professional development plan.
- 5. Navigate the job hunting process.
- 6. Articulate personal professional goals.

Course Prerequisite or Corequisite: Taken during the final semester of study

Required Text

Rubin, Richard E. *Foundations of Library and Information Science*. New York: Neal Schuman. The edition you used in *Foundations* will be fine.

Assignments

Major presentation and paper: You will prepare a conference-style presentation and a paper of publishable quality on a topic of your choice, with the topic subject to instructor approval. Presentations will last 15-20 minutes, with 10 minutes for questions and discussion. Paper length and style will depend on topic and on requirements of appropriate publication venues. Paper topic selection due June 11. Draft due July 20. Optional rehearsal or "dry run" of presentation, July 23-25. Presentation and final paper are due at class on July 27, 2007.

Portfolio: You will update, present and discuss your portfolio. Feedback will be provided by the instructor and classmates. Discussion and sharing of portfolio issues should occur via WebCT Vista. Revised portfolios must be mailed by July 16, 2007.

Professional Development Plan: Each student will create and record a personal plan for professional development. For students who need to seek employment, this will include a detailed job-hunting plan. For all students, this will include plans for solidifying and updating their professional knowledge in the two-year period following graduation. Submit via WebCT Vista no later than July 6, 2007.

Reflection on MLIS Experience: Each student will prepare an essay that reflects on and evaluates his or her experience with the MLIS degree program. The essay will include the student's determination of strengths and weaknesses within the program. Submit via Web CT Vista no later than July 13, 2007.

Current Issues Discussions: The class will be divided into two groups. All students will review the assigned text. Group one will choose a topic and present an issue and offer a position or opinion why the issue is important for librarianship. Group two will react to the position, which may be pro or con. Group one members will need to communicate among themselves to arrive at consensus about the issue. One person will post. All members of Group two will react on the discussion list. All discussion will end in five days. Group roles will then reverse. The reacting group will choose a topic from the next chapters and post it to the discussion list by the next due date.
