a panel presentation or a poster presentation.


Topics ranged from political television ads to effects of caffeine and music on scholastic ability.

Bartram Award Deadline is March 1st

Do you demonstrate intellectual exploration, adventure and achievement? Have you considered applying for the William Bartram Award for Intellectual Exploration?

The deadline for the Bartram Award is March 1.

To receive the award, students must meet the following requirements:

- have a grade point average of 3.30 or higher
- be classified as a sophomore or junior
- be currently enrolled in Honors classes or else have completed all Honors College requirements
- demonstrate exceptional research, scholarly or creative activity in a course of study

In order to apply, students must turn in a completed packet, which includes


- A nomination packet (found on the Honors website)
- A letter of recommendation from a faculty member
- A printed or electronic copy of your project (research or creative)
- An essay of 500 words or less detailing the project

Nomination forms may be picked up at the Honors House or online at www.valdosta.edu/honors.

Each spring it is awarded to an exceptional Honors College student.

The winner will receive an invitation to the President's award dinner because it is a university wide accolade! Recipients of the award, as well as their projects, are listed on the Honors College website.

The Bartram Award is named for famed explorer and naturalist William Bartram and recognized exceptional achievement.

Hugh C. Bailey Scholarship Application Due Soon!

Don't forget to apply for the Hugh C. Bailey Scholarship! March 1 is the deadline, and it is quickly approaching!

The scholarships are available on the Honors College's website: www.valdosta.edu/honors.

Students applying for the scholarship must meet these requirements:

 be a full-time student who has been admitted to the Honors College and who has completed between 45 and 75 semester hours, including at least 10 semester hours in the VSU Honors Program

- have a grade point average of at least 3.6 for all courses completed, including Honors courses taken at VSU
- must exemplify the spirit of inquiry and service that characterizes the Honors College

The scholarships are awarded for one academic year.

The scholarship amount varies with the earnings of the endowment fund.

The Hugh C. Bailey Scholarship was created by the late Dr. Bailey to encourage academic excellence in

every discipline in the Honors College. Dr. Bailey was President of

VSU from 1978-2001. The Honors House was once Dr. Bailey's, but he bestowed it as a gift to the Honors College in the spring of 2007.

Kelly Wins, Takes Home Prize from GCHC

Chase Kelly, a junior history major, was one of only eight students, out of a total of 150, to receive an award at the 30th annual Georgia Collegiate Honors Conference held

February 8-9 at Georgia Southern University.

Kelly placed second in the social science category for the "Best Poster/Paper" competition.

"It was a great surprise that I won an award for my paper," Kelly said.

First place winners received \$300 and second place received \$100.

The winning paper, "Franklin D. Roosevelt: Popular Support and Pearl Harbor," was judged on mechanics, approach/methodology, and analysis & argument. The judges combined this score with his presentation score.

The presentations were evaluated based on the following criteria:

presentation of content, presentation style and handling of questions.

The papers and posters were not judged separately. Therefore, a poster could have beaten a paper.

Although Kelly is

proud of his award, he says the most rewarding aspect was being able to be a part of the conference.

"I think it was even more exciting to be able to see all the great things students from across the state are doing...I believe that was the best part of it: to be able to be a part of

the students that love what they do

and loving sharing it with others. It is an awesome feeling," Kelly said.

Kelly was one of ten students from VSU to present his research at the conference.

With Norton tak-


ing over as President, a vacant spot
